The electric incubator is said to be much safer, surer and more economical than the oil-heated apparatus. Current entering the incubator passes through resistance elements in the top of the box; these are arranged to distribute the heat evenly over the 75 eggs below. Double insulating walls prevent the escape of heat, while a thermostat keeps temperature constant. Ventilation is likewise automatic.

Telephone Company's Position

The New York Telephone Company's position regarding the law recently passed by the State Legislature amending the Public Service Commission's Law to give the Commission power under certain conditions to suspend new rates filed by the telephone companies was explained to-day by Mr. W. J. O'Hea, District Commercial Manager, in a statement given to the press.

He stated that the amendment to the law which became effective on Sept. 27th when the Governor signed the bill known as the "Gibbs Bill" was satisfactory to the Telephone Company.

In the form in which it was finally passed at the recent special session the bill eliminated features in previous bills to which the Telephone Company objected. The Company at no time has objected to a bill which was fair to both the subscribers and the Company.

CITIZENSHIP COLUMN

Rights and Duties of American Citizenship Explained

NOTE—The following lessons from the "CIVICS CATECHISM," released by the N. C. W. C. committee on Civic Education, offer an excellent opportunity to our readers to inform themselves on the principles underlying our American government. These lessons comprise a short course in civics for use in our elementary schools, academies, men's and women's clubs, in community Americanization work, and in the study of citizenship generally. The course should prove of special interest to our women readers who have come into the right of suffrage. Study these lessons and learn more about our glorious American.

LESSON I

Chapter I—American Democracy

1. Q. In what country do you live?
A. In the United States of America.
2. Q. When was America discovered?
A. In 1492.
3. Q. Who discovered America?
A. Christopher Columbus, an Italian, who sailed under the Spanish flag.
4. Q. Why did the ships of Columbus fly the Spanish flag?
A. Because of all the monarchs of Europe, the rulers of Spain, Ferdinand and Isabella, were the only ones willing to supply him with the means for his voyage of discovery.
5. Q. How did this country receive the name of America?
A. From the name of Americus Vesputius, an Italian who sailed to the new World shortly after its discovery by Columbus.
6. Q. By whom was America settled?
A. By people from Spain, France, England, Ireland, Holland, and Sweden.
7. Q. Why did these colonists come to America?
A. For many reasons. Some came to seek gold and precious stones, some to have the right of free speech, some to have the freedom of religious worship, some to escape the harsh laws of their own country, others to build up a country where the people might rule.
8. Q. What European country finally gained control over all the Colonies along the Atlantic Coast?
A. England finally ruled the thirteen American Colonies.
9. Q. Why did England lose control of the Colonies?
A. Because of unjust taxation which caused the Colonists to revolt in 1775.
10. Q. What famous document was signed July 4, 1776?
A. The Declaration of Independence, written by Thomas Jefferson and signed by representatives of the Colonies to be free and independent States.
