The Lord Mayor of Cork, Terence MacSwiney, died in Brixton prison on Monday. He was entering upon the seventy-fourth day of his hunger strike as a protest against a sentence of two years' imprisonment on several charges, including one of having in his possession seditious documents.

Only his brother, John MacSwiney, and his private chaplain, Father Dominic were with the Lord Mayor when he died. Mrs. MacSwiney, and the prisoner's two sisters, Anna and Mary, were at a nearby hotel.

The Lord Mayor, who was terribly emaciated as a result of his long abstinence from food, for many hours had been delirious and was unconscious when death came.

THE GLADIATOR WILL SING

The Eminent Actor-Evangelist, Robert Downing, who for many years appeared in the role of the "Gladiator" and other classical roles, is this year appearing as "Joe Morgan" in the wonderful play "Ten Nights in a Bar Room" under the management of Mr. A. C. Aiston, the well-known and successful producer of plays and several prominent actors.

During the action of the play several very beautiful songs will be rendered by different members of the company, among which will be a song that is entirely new to the present generation of theatre-goers, but was very popular when sung by Mr. Downing in the production of Joaquin Miller's western play "Tally-ho".

It is entitled "Here's to You, Tom Moore." Mr. Downing is the only one who is singing this song, it being his own personal property. It seems strange to think of a man who has been seen in so many tragedies during his career, but it is not generally known that Mr. Downing was one of the first men who sang the part of Captain Coreoran in "Pinafore" when it was first brought to this country. In fact it was a question when he first produced "Spartacus, the Gladiator" whether he would not star in the comic opera of "The Little Tycoon" in the part of General Knickerbocker.

Mr. Downing's experience as an actor, has been to play many parts, not only Tragedy but Comedy, Farce and Musical plays. So

it may sound strange to many to think of him as a singer. This production of this old play is a new version entirely and will be seen at Arcade Theatre, Rear of Reynolds Arcade, commencing Monday, Nov. 1, matinees Tuesday, Wednesday and Saturday 2:15 p.m.

LEOW'S STAR.

Marion Davies in "The Restless Sex."

In "The Restless Sex," the screen has risen to new heights in artistry and a picture has been made that is fairly entitled to be ranked among the best. There is a fascination of beauty about this photoplay and a skillful interpretation of Robert W. Chambers' rather allegorical story that compels interest and it serves as a vehicle to prove that Marion Davies is an "honest-to-goodness" actress rather than the mere pretty-girl—she has seemed in other pictures.

Probably first in the qualities by which "The Restless Sex" rises to unusual heights of artistry is the lavish beauty that has been expended in staging it. Joseph Urban was called in to supervise this, and he has done his work well. Not only in the spectacular scenes of the Ball of the Gods and Pageant of Pallas, Athens, veritable riots of color and life, but in other settings is his master hand apparent. Next, Robert Z. Leonard, the director, has been able to catch the successful producer of plays and difficult subtleties of a Chambers' story and transfer them to pictures. Miss Davies fits the role of heroine of the story so well that it might have been written especially for her. She displays a sense of repose, and her expressions reveal a care, clarity of purpose and conviction that are striking in comparison with her former performances.

The story of the "Restless Sex" is typically Chambers. Stephanie, the heroine, is innocently involved in an episode which compels her to marry Oswald Grimmer, though she loves Jim Cleland, her brother by adoption. When Jim returns from Europe he discovers that Stephanie is unhappy and attempts to straighten matters out. Much of the plot here is dependent upon mental attitudes but Leonard has succeeded in making many of the struggles of mind clear. Oswald finally eliminates himself from the triangle and the story ends happily.

"The Restless Sex" is a play that maintains the standard set by Dreyfus and is thoroughly entertaining.
