The Knights of Columbus is supposed to be the representative organization of Catholic men in the United States. It is supposed to have within its ranks the best Catholic men. They are men supposed to know and to be devoted to the principles of their religion. They are considered the leaders of the Catholic community, to be foremost in advancing the interests of the Church in America.

Admitting that all these boasts of our virtues are true and that we are the leaders of the Catholic community, can we hope to keep them true and to hold our leadership if we do not know what our Church stands for and what our Church is doing in this country: if we do not know how to defend the Church against the attacks of her enemies? The Knights of Columbus and Rochester Council, No. 178, have grown so large that neither the Columbian nor the Columbian can afford to devote much space to the general or particular activities of the church in which the Knights of Columbus are not directly concerned as an organization. Neither can they give much to attacks upon the Church, while it goes without saying that they can give almost nothing to the doctrines of the Church or to her stand upon particular questions. They have too much need of space for news of their own doings and their own work.

It follows, then, that the members if they will be true Knights, must keep themselves informed upon Catholic matters through other sources. They should read Catholic papers, magazines and books. There is an abundance of pamphlets nowadays dealing with Catholic beliefs and practices, and with the position of the Church upon social questions and answering attacks made upon these. It is comparatively easy for any Catholic man to keep well-informed upon them. The book racks in our Churches are filled with literature of value to Catholics. How many of the members of our parishes pass them by without so much as a glance.

Sir Knights, the Church looks to you as her second line of defense. You come directly after the priesthood. Are you doing what you should to justify your position as a Knight and the hope of the Church in you? Do you read Catholic papers or magazines or Catholic literature? Each one must answer this question for himself. The true Knight's answer will be "Yes."—The Columbian.
