**Priest To Celebrate  
25th Anniversary  
Of Ordination**

Penn Yan, Dec. 16.—On Saturday Father Bernard W. Gommenginger, pastor of St. Michael's Church, will celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination. Besides the pastorate of St. Michael's Church, he has charge of St. Andrew's Church at Dundee. Father Gommenginger came to Penn Yan from Lyons in June, 1916, and relieved one of the most popular priests ever here. In doing this he had taken a large job, but the personality of Father Gommenginger was not to be denied. He had been pastor of the church at Lyons for thirteen years.

Father Gommenginger was ordained by the late Right Rev. Bishop McQuaid, of Rochester. He was born in Rochester, and was the son of Louis Gommenginger, who lost his life while on duty in that city on the detective force. He was graduated from Immaculate Conception Parochial School. He first studied for the priesthood at St. Andrew's Seminary in Rochester, and from there went to St. Joseph's Provincial Seminary at Troy and finished at St. Bernard's Seminary in Rochester. On account of ill health he was not ordained with his class in June, which accounts for the time of his ordination, in December.

During Father Gommenginger's stay here he has been assisted most of the time by Rev. Patrick A. Kelly, also formerly of Rochester. He is a hard worker and has also won a great many friends here.

**CATHOLIC CLUBHOUSE  
OPENED BY CATHOLIC  
WOMEN OF BOSTON**

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Boston, Dec. 10.—Thousands of members of League of Catholic Women of Massachusetts and their friends attended yesterday the informal opening of the new and beautiful Diocesan Clubhouse which they intend to operate as a welfare center as well as a place of social gathering. His Eminence, Cardinal O'Connell has presented to the clubhouse a valuable library of several hundred volumes of classic religious, educational and fictional literature.

The clubhouse is quartered in a five-story building at the corner of Arlington and Beacon Streets. It is finished throughout in black walnut. The furniture, draperies and coverings are in ocre and browns to harmonize with the interior finish. The whole cost of the building was met by the Women's League, which raised money in a special campaign.

One of the most artistic and interesting of the rooms is that set aside as a reception room for Cardinal O'Connell. This room is richly finished in cardinal red, and provided with furniture and

hangings in appropriate colors. These furnishings were the gift of Mrs. Maurice J. Curran.

There is a large Assembly hall on the second floor and a dining room, capable of accommodating 100 guests at a sitting, on the first floor. In this room tea will be served from three until five o'clock each afternoon. A number of rooms have been furnished for transients and visitors. There are also reading rooms and classrooms, where the educational work of the league is to be conducted. Among the courses open to women are those in English, Spanish, Italian, millinery, domestic science, designing and dress-making, and a special course in ethics for the younger members of the congregation.
