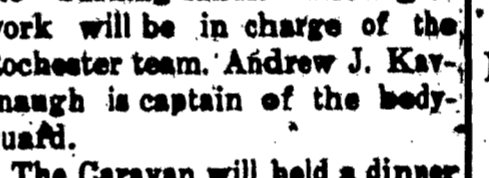
Order of Alhambra
