Irish Republic Organization Adds Members

The local branch of the American Association for Recognition of the Irish Republic Wednesday night added 500 members to its roster, making a total of 1,818 members in this city. The meeting, at which the new members were initiated, was held at Masonerchor Hall where the association provided a programme of divertissement, including vocal and instrumental music and dancing.

Several talks were given, the principal speakers being Attorney James E. Cuff, Michael T. Ryan, national director and State President Leo A. MacSweeney.

Although the organization in state is comparatively young it has approximately 75,000 members, Mr. MacSweeney says, and at least 500 councils have been organized within the past two months. The state president looks for at least 250,000 members in this state by the end of April. The movement is being organized throughout the country with the specific purpose of having the United States government recognize the "Republic of Ireland."

Will of Father Dougherty

Canandaigua, March 2.—Property to the value of about \$20,000 was left by Rev. James T. Dougherty, who died at Phoenix, Ariz., on February 7th, according to papers filed in the surrogate's office.

The will provides that the executors shall transfer the title to the lake shore property to any organization indicated by "Camp Madonna."

Legacies given include \$1,000 to St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester; \$200 to St. Mary's Boys' Asylum, Rochester; \$200 to St. Patrick's Church, Dansville; \$200 to St. Patrick's Girls' Orphan Asylum, Rochester; \$200 to St. Mary's Hospital, Rochester; \$200 to St. Anne's Home for the Aged, Rochester; \$100 to St. Theresa's Church, Stanley; \$50 to Holy Name Church, Groveland; and \$50 to St. Mary's Church, Rushville.

A legacy of \$500 to Ella D. Hogan, a housekeeper at the Canandaigua rectory and \$500 is set aside to be expended by the executor in payment for masses to be said for the repose of the soul of the deceased priest.
