## Padraic Pearse Council

Leo A. MacSweeney, re-elected State President of the A. A. R. I. R., has issued a circular letter to all members of Padraic Pearse Council. It follows:—

Wishing to give you every aid possible in the important work of securing a large membership in the American Association for the Recognition of the Irish Republic, I have condensed the aim and work of the Association in the following:

First: The aim of the organization is to secure from Congress official recognition of the existing Irish Republic. In asking this we are doing nothing that can possibly be construed as un-American, nor can it be construed as an un-friendly act toward another power. No nation has a right to govern another nation without its consent, and this principle was clearly enunciated by the United States upon entrance into the World War and was accepted by those countries who sought our aid, Great Britain included. Recognition of a nation struggling to be free is no new departure, either in the history of the United States or in the history of the world. We do not ask, nor does Ireland wish, any armed intervention; simply a recognition of the Justice of Ireland's claim to complete nationhood, which included the right to set up such form of government as the great majority of her people have, and shall elect.

Second: We wish Congress to compel the immediate payment of the interest due on foreign loans. We have the spectacle of our government pleading inability to pay a soldier bonus which is justly due every American soldier who forsook his ordinary pursuits to engage in what he supposed was a war to make the world safe for Democracy, and while pleading this inability, no attempt is being made to collect the interest due on loans made to various European governments. These governments are using the interest money due us to maintain huge military establishments; Great Britain uses it to carry on a war of extermination in Ireland, India and Egypt, and thus the money that you and I loaned our country in the Liberty Bond issues, is indirectly used for purposes which true Americans abhor and detest.

Third: We want to make our United States what it was prior to our partnership with decadent monarchies and aristocracies—a haven of refuge and opportunity for the oppressed of the world. We want a flag that our children will love as we loved it when we pledged our allegiance to it, knowing that it stood for liberty and justice for all.

These are our aims and if we are true to them we will not only help Ireland, but make our own country a better country to live in. With this in mind, I know you will keep up your valuable work in the cause.
