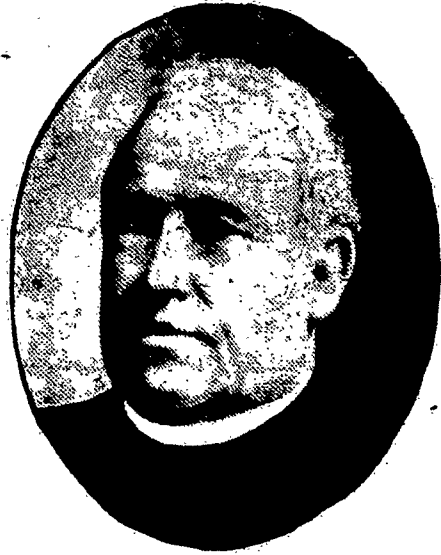

**CHURCH NEWS**

**Cathedral.**

The feast of St. Patrick, the apostle of Ireland, was celebrated with great solemnity at St. Patrick's Cathedral on Thursday morning. Solemn high mass was sung at 10 o'clock by the Rev. Michael J. Nolan, D. D., chancellor of the diocese, in the absence of Bishop Thomas F. Hickey. He was assisted by the Rev. George V. Burns, of Sacred Heart Church as deacon, and the Rev. Edward T. Meagher, Ph. B., of St. Bernard's Seminary, as sub-deacon. The student body of St. Bernard's Seminary, and the Cathedral boys' and men's choir sang the mass. Many of the city clergy were in the sanctuary and special reservations were made for representing of various sisterhoods of the diocese in the center aisle.

The Cathedral was artistically decorated with flags, bunting, lights and cut flowers, and at the close of the mass souvenirs of the celebration, containing the picture and story of Blessed Oliver Plunkett, the Irish martyr, were distributed while the congregation sang "Holy God." Irish airs were played as an organ prelude and postlude.

The panegyric of the day was preached by the Rev. Francis Patrick Lyons, C. S. P., of St. Paul's College, Washington.

**Telegram from Bishop.**

The following telegram was received at the Cathedral from Bishop Hickey, who is in Florida recuperating his health by the doctor's orders. The telegram was read at the services:

"Daytona, Florida,  
March 16, 1921.  
Rev. J. F. O'Hern, Rochester, N. Y.  
"Regret deeply my absence from the celebration of the patronal feast of our Cathedral, but will be united in prayer with those at home, and while sending to priests and people affectionate and respectful greetings, I venture to express the hope that the contributions for relief of the destitute in Ireland will be worthy of the splendidly charitable spirit of our people in Rochester."
