organization and under his leadership the programme of the chorus is fast being given the finishing touches, Olive Kline, the brilliant American soprano has been engaged to act as soloist.

The choral society is composed of men selected from the various Catholic choirs of Rochester and has in its ranks much of the best choral talent of the city. Its programme is one that should prove pleasing. It includes numbers of a representative type and is exceptionally varied.

Proceeds of the concert are to be turned over to the Knights of Columbus Building Fund and will be used for the erection of a new clubhouse. Tickets can be obtained from any member of the Knights of Columbus. The seat sale begins Friday, April 8th at Boucher's Flower Store at 30 East Avenue.

In Olive Kline, the chorus has a soloist of national repute. Miss Kline is known not only through her successes on the concert stage but also through the innumerable phonograph records she has made.
