

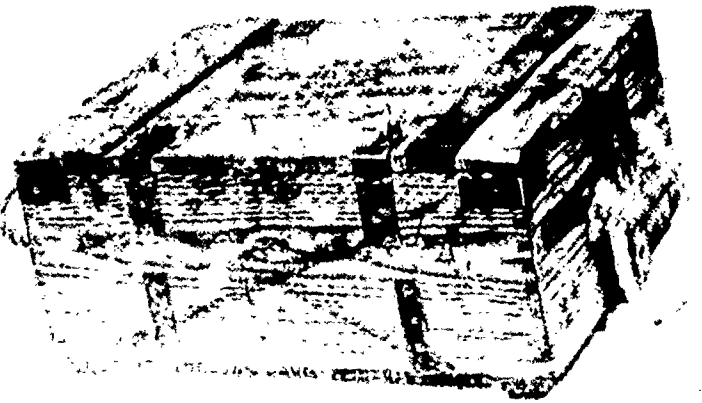
Where Rochester Mail Was Handled 30 Years Ago

Catholic Students Mission Crusade
The Missions

Years ago a group of simple fishermen was banded together to Christianize the world. This colossal task was evidently beyond the powers of mere men, but the credentials of the Apostles in this great work were based on the power of the dictum of Christ, "Going therefore, teach all nations: baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, and behold I am with you all days even to the end of the world". This commission was addressed to the priests and laity of the Church of today not less forcibly than to the Apostles of the first Century. And it is especially timely today because of the altered conditions in Europe since the war. We are now better able to meet the demands of the Missions than our poverty stricken brethren across the Atlantic, who have been their mainstay in the past. Shall we shrink the urgent needs made manifest to us or shall some be found willing to take up the burning torch and carry on the work reluctantly set aside by stayed hands?

The American people are not slow to recognize the needs of their oppressed brethren, but they are slow in putting into practice that charity with which the heart is brimming over. Cardinal Manning has said, "Every member of the Catholic and Apostolic Church ought to consider it an honor and a glory to be included in the sublime commission to labor for the conversion of the pagan nations".

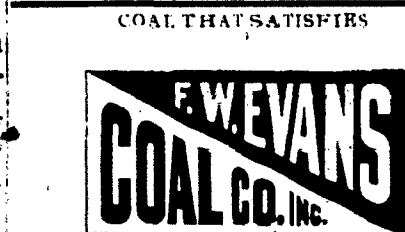

Emigration Of Irish Catholics To U. S.

Dublin, April 2.—It is feared that the natural increase in the population of Ireland may be largely offset by emigration. In the month of February the exodus was greater than in any corresponding period since 1900. Altogether 1,380 persons emigrated in February. This was 1,361 more than the average of the ten years 1910—1919. The one consolation in the February figures is that out of the 1880 emigrants, 1,670 went to the United States, and as emigration was greatest from Munster and Connaught it follows that practically all those who have gone to the United States are Catholics. The majority of the emigrants are girls.

Sacred Heart Seminary Burned

New York, April 8.—Fifty-four small boys were led to safety by Sister St. Hilary, mother superior of Sacred Heart Seminary, Hempstead, L. I., this week, when the building caught fire during class hours and was soon destroyed. The institution was conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph. The damage is estimated at \$50,000. The Blessed Sacrament was saved from the burning chapel by the Rev. Father Robert Boyle.
