Community Chest Slogan Now Used In Fourteen Cities

Since the 1920 Community Chest campaign about 14 cities have adopted the slogan "Suppose Nobody Cared?" and several cities have used the poster with the consent of the Rochester Community Chest, Cincinnati, which conducted a campaign the first week of the present month, used 16,000 of the Rochester posters. The design was drawn by Miss Lillian O. Titus, a Rochester artist and illustrator, who visited several local orphanages to find the type of child desired as a subject for her sketch. Rochester was the first city in the country to use "Suppose Nobody Cared?" as a slogan. It tells the whole story and conveys in concrete form the very spirit and essence of the Community Chest cause. Because both the slogan and poster have been proven to carry a strong appeal, it was decided to use them in the forthcoming campaign.
