They Are "It"

The following news story in the New York "World" proves who own all the big hotels in New York City—what is known as the "Rockefeller-Armour-Ruppert combination:—

A calm, quietly dressed man arrived in this city yesterday, and in a few hours completed one of the largest bond transactions that has escaped the big bankers of New York, Chicago and Boston in recent years.

In his brief visit Josiah Kirby, President of the Cleveland Discount Company of Cleveland, received the final signatures of the principal stockholders of the Westchester-Biltmore Corporation, including Percy Rockefeller, John McE. Bowman, William Wrigley jr., J. W. Harriman, J. Ogden Armour and Col. Jacob Ruppert to a \$3,000,000 bond issue.

The importance of the transaction hinges on the inability of these financiers to obtain money at as cheap rates here as they could in the Middle West. Large houses in the principal cities of the country had bid for the issue, but the Cleveland concern underbid them all.

The loan was obtained by the corporation headed by Mr. Bowman, President of the Pershing Square group of hotels, to provide money for the completion of the immense suburban hotel now under construction near Rye, which is to be known as the Westchester-Biltmore. Completed, the property will be held at \$7,000,000.

This combination owns the Biltmore, Commodore, Murray Hill, Belmont, Ansonia and other of the leading hostleries in the Metropolis.

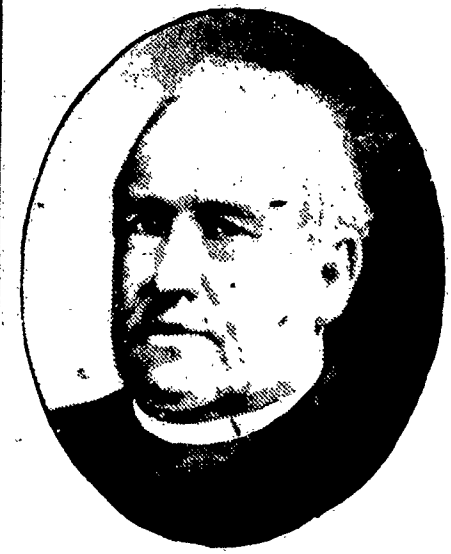
