Sixteen Young Women Take First Vows at Holy Rosary Church

Last Saturday morning at the Church of the Holy Rosary sixteen young women were received into the Congregation of the Sisters of St. Joseph. The ceremony was conducted by Bishop Thomas F. Hickey of the Diocese of Rochester, assisted by Rev. Chas. W. Lyons and Rev. M. J. Nolan, with Rev. A. A. Hughes, pastor of the church, and Rev. John Sellinger, as masters of ceremonies. Arthur Kreckel and Thomas Toole of St. Bernard's Seminary acted as acolytes.

This is the first time that such a ceremony has taken place within the walls of a Rochester parish church, the chapel of Nazareth Convent in Jay street serving that purpose for the past fifty years.

At the close of the ceremonies Bishop Hickey spoke to the young religious, emphasizing the high ideals to which they had consecrated their lives, and exhorted them to persevere in their service to God and humanity.

The music for the occasion was given by the convent choir. The church was filled with relatives and friends of the young sisters and a number of priests were present in the sanctuary.
