**Blessing of Graves  
Will Take Place  
On Sunday**

The ceremony of the blessing of the graves in Holy Sepulcher Cemetery will take place Sunday afternoon. This is a unique and impressive religious ceremony that has occurred annually for more than thirty years, having been inaugurated by the late Bishop Bernard McQuaid when Holy Sepulcher Cemetery was opened.

At 8 o'clock on Sunday the procession will leave St. Bernard's Seminary, in Lake avenue. The blessing will be done by Bishop Thomas F. Hickey. In the procession will be the students of St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary, and of St. Bernard's Seminary. Accompanying the Bishop will be the priests of the city. The procession will go from the seminary to the chapel in Holy Sepulcher Cemetery, where the vespers of the dead will be chanted by the students, under the direction of Rev. John M. Petter.

After vespers the procession will march through all parts of the cemetery, while the students chant and the Bishop sprinkles holy water over the graves. Returning to the chapel the harmonized Benedictus will be sung and Bishop Hickey will preach. The ceremony will be closed by pontifical benediction.

Within the last six months there have been more than twelve hundred burials in Holy Sepulcher Cemetery and it has been necessary to open two new sections in that part of the cemetery on the west side of Lake avenue. There are more than fifty thousand graves in the cemetery. Thousands of the graves are decorated especially for the Sunday when the blessing of the graves takes place, and the next few days will see hundreds of people visiting the cemetery to place flowers on the graves of their loved ones.

The annual ceremony always attracts a large crowd and if the weather is pleasant it is safe to say that more than twenty-five thousand people will be at the cemetery to see the religious procession and to take part in the services.
