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
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Interesting Parish News

Sullivan, a former World War Veteran, were held at 9:30 o'clock Monday morning from the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Sullivan, 102 Sawyer street and at 10 o'clock from this church. Solemn high mass of requiem was celebrated by the Rev. John P. Brophy, assisted by Rev. Cornelius J. Hogan as deacon and the Rev. Francis J. Ryan as sub-deacon. Services were of military character, being conducted by members of Cooper Marine Post. The bearers were Captain C. Ball, Francis Wiethorn, Lewis Cook, L.L. Reynolds, Frank Boight and James Kane. Interment was made in the family lot in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, final blessing at the grave being given by the Rev. John McMahon, chaplain of St. Ann's Home for the Aged. A firing squad of former marines fired a salute as the body was lowered in the grave.

Mr. Sullivan was a former member of the marines and served in Santo Domingo where he contracted disease which caused his death.
