Rice Supreme. Cook one-half cupful of rice until tender and drain. Melt two table-spoonfuls of butter...

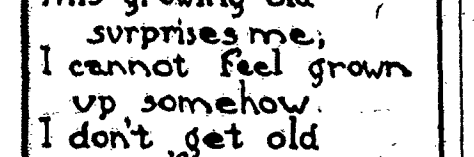
Meat Souffle. Melt three table-spoonfuls of butter, add three table-spoonfuls of flour...
