**Their Model.**

In an eloquent address before  
 the National Council of Catholic  
 Women, Rt. Rev. Edmund Gib-  
 bons, Bishop of Albany, N. Y.,  
 gave forth these sentiments  
 which should be treasured by  
 every Catholic woman:—How ar-  
 dently Catholic women should  
 love their Church! The Church  
 has ever honored your sex. The  
 Church has been your emancipa-  
 tor, your protector and defender.  
 The Church has ever recognized  
 your talents and capabilities, and  
 given you every encouragement  
 in lawful and becoming activities.  
 "The Church and the clergy  
 depend largely upon the devoted-  
 ness and aid of our faithful wom-  
 en. She was founded by Christ to  
 teach, govern, sanctify and save  
 all men. She will therefore to  
 enter into their minds, their  
 hearts and their lives, to be the  
 protector of the family, the savior  
 of society, the bulwark of civil  
 government. To effect all this she  
 must have the co-operation of  
 the women; for if they are lack-  
 ing in faith and virtue and moral-  
 ity, the very source of life is  
 poisoned and polluted, the family  
 is disrupted and demoralized and  
 society threatened with destruc-  
 tion."

"Behold the handmaid of the  
 Lord," exclaimed that peerless  
 woman, that "blessed among  
 women," when the will of the  
 Most High was manifested to  
 her, to use her as the agent of  
 His greatest work, the Incarna-  
 tion of His Divine Son. "Behold  
 the handmaid of the Lord," will  
 ing and ready to do her part be-  
 neath the overshadowing of the  
 Holy Spirit of God.

"With profound reverence to  
 the Glory and Model of her sex,  
 every good Catholic woman should  
 utter in her heart the same sen-  
 timent as Mary, "Behold the  
 handmaid of the Lord," the ex-  
 pression of her eagerness to co-  
 operate with the Church, the  
 bishops of the Church, the priests  
 of the Church in their arduous  
 labors—for the Church is Christ's  
 power, and authority and truth  
 and grace.

 the proffered price of 80 cents a

 of Christmas.

Americans should not forget

 States.

 endeared himself to those with  
 whom he came in contact that it  
 would be hard with very truth: "He  
 was an enemy in the world."

**Charity**

Not only the wealthy but the  
 middle class Catholics—the poor  
 always do their share in all good  
 works—should take to heart the  
 following burning words of Bishop  
 McNicholas, uttered at the re-  
 cent session of the National  
 Conference of Catholic Charities  
 in Milwaukee.

"Can we not go forth from this  
 Conference with a renewed and  
 strengthened determination to do  
 more than ever for the mission of  
 charity. We priests and bishops  
 may ask ourselves whether we  
 are preaching sufficiently the duty  
 which Catholics have of contrib-  
 uting to works of charity. Guided  
 by the teaching of Leo XIII, we  
 hold steadfastly to the right of  
 possessing private property. We  
 acknowledge, however, that right  
 to be a secondary one. With St.  
 Thomas Aquinas, we must in-  
 struct our people that the use of  
 the administration of our posses-  
 sions is not absolutely and exclu-  
 sively our own, for love of neigh-  
 bor commands us to share them  
 with others in their need. This is  
 not radical or socialistic doctrine,  
 but it is the illuminating teaching  
 of the Fathers of the Church and  
 of its greatest Doctors. Are we  
 preaching sufficiently that super-  
 fluous possessions, at least in part,  
 should be put at the disposal of  
 those who need them? We are  
 not suggesting that this be  
 brought about by legislation in  
 this age when there is an insane  
 desire for legislation, but rather  
 we must try to have individuals  
 embrace Christian principles, we  
 must give them an opportunity to  
 be ennobled by Christian tradi-  
 tions so that by their voluntary  
 acts they will form a social sci-  
 ence and assume a social re-  
 sponsibility. Are we preaching  
 that the rich should invest a por-  
 tion of their possessions for the  
 welfare of the poor and needy?  
 Are we timid in telling our Cath-  
 olic people that no last will and  
 testament should be drawn up  
 signed without remembering the  
 interests of charity? In the ages  
 of faith, bishops fearlessly  
 condemned the actions of kings,  
 princes and those of the wealthy  
 classes who deferred until their  
 deathbed the distribution of their  
 possessions among the poor. Many  
 of our Catholics are failing in this  
 duty even at the supreme mo-  
 ment of death. Let us remind  
 them of it, but better let us urge  
 them now to be their own almon-  
 ers. We Catholics can have a  
 large share in forming the public  
 opinion that there is a duty in  
 life and at death of giving to the  
 poor and to the needy sick."

**Play Ball!**

If Great Britain can take a  
 "naval holiday" then the United  
 States Congress should act  
 promptly and give President  
 Harding the necessary authority  
 to follow suit.

The United States, through its  
 Secretary of State laid down the  
 original proposition for the ten  
 year naval holiday—during which  
 no new battleships would be  
 built and work was to be at once  
 suspended on those warships  
 under construction.

When this proposal was made  
 by the United States to the other  
 great nations, the latter naturally  
 supposed it was this country's  
 adopted programme, provided  
 the other powers agreed.

We must practise what we
