**St. Ambrose Church  
Formally Opened  
By Bishop Hickey**

At a solemn pontifical high  
mass Bishop Thomas F. Hickey  
opened formally for worship last  
Sunday the new Church of St.  
Ambrose at Clifford avenue and  
Culver road. With the erection of  
St. Ambrose's there now are  
thirty-one Catholic churches in  
Rochester. Rev. Walter McCar-  
thy, formerly treasurer of St.  
Bernard's Seminary, is the first  
pastor, and it is expected that  
soon a permanent church build-  
ing, parochial school and rectory  
will be constructed.

The Bishop spoke in the  
following words:—

"The solemn service of today  
in this humble structure gives to  
Rochester another link in the  
chain of Catholic churches that  
encircle our fair city. We have  
now within the borders of Roch-  
ester thirty-one Catholic churches  
and public chapels where our peo-  
ple assemble for divine worship  
and represent in Catholic educa-  
tion schools with a population of  
more than seventeen thousand  
children.

"This one special work of the  
church in the education of the  
young is not only contributing  
moral strength to the community,  
but it is also saving to the tax-  
payers an additional item of more  
than \$1,000,000 annually which  
would be required to house and  
educate these children now pro-  
vided for by our system of Cath-  
olic education.

"This simple and withal prac-  
tical building, to be used for  
divine worship, is erected here  
to carry on the work of religion  
and is, we hope, but the begin-  
ning that materially will contrib-  
ute to the artistic beauty of this  
section of the city, and spiritually  
will be a valuable force in mold-  
ing and directing human lives."

Present-day tendencies in  
motion-picture exhibitions and  
dances were criticized by the  
bishop.

Assisting the bishop at the pon-  
tifical mass were: archpriest, Rt.  
Rev. Dennis G. Curran, V. G., of  
Corpus Christi; deacons of honor,  
Rev. John F. Nelligan, of Holy  
Apostles, and Rev. John B. Sul-  
livan, of St. John the Evangelist  
Church; deacon of the mass, Rev.  
J. F. Goggin; and subdeacon,  
Rev. Edward J. Meagher, profes-  
sors at St. Bernard's Seminary;  
master of ceremonies, Rev. John  
M. Sellinger, secretary to Bishop  
Hickey.

In the sanctuary were Rev. J.  
Emil Gefell, of SS. Peter and  
Paul's; Rev. Arthur A. Hughes,  
of Holy Rosary; Rev. George V.  
Burns, of Sacred Heart Church,  
and Rev. William Stauder, of  
Webster.


