**Made Irremovable Rector of Church**

Rev. Joseph S. Cameron has been named and will begin immediately his duties as rector of the Church of the Immaculate Conception, in Plymouth avenue north. Father Cameron, who has been in charge of St. Mary's parish in Bath for the past four years, was appointed on Monday to the irremovable rectorship of the church in this city. No appointment of a successor to Father Cameron at the Bath church will be made immediately.



Although the appointment of Father Cameron became known on Monday no official announcement was made until Wednesday afternoon by the bishop. Father Cameron succeeds Rev. Augustine M. O'Neill, who died on December 20th last.

Father Cameron was born in Geneva and was educated at St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary and graduated from St. Bernard's Seminary in 1906. After his ordination he was for nine years assistant pastor at St. Mary's Church in Rochester. During part of that time he was superintendent of all parochial schools in the diocese and in that capacity presided at conferences of the Catholic school teachers.

After leaving St. Mary's church he was sent to the Church of the Immaculate Conception at Ithaca for two years. Two years later he was sent to Bath.

A younger brother, Rev. Ignatius Cameron, was ordained to the priesthood last June. He is now stationed at Auburn.

**Cathedral.**

Mrs. Mary C. Hone, widow of Alexander B. Hone, one of the original members of the firm of Burke, Fitz Simons, Hone & Company, died Wednesday at her home at 88 Clinton avenue south. She was a member of one of the best known older families of Rochester.

The funeral will take place on Saturday morning at 9:30 o'clock from the home and at 10 o'clock from St. Patrick's Cathedral. Interment will be made in Holy Sepulcher Cemetery.

**NEW CATHOLIC CHAPEL**

A Catholic chapel is to be built at the Monroe County Tuberculosis Sanatorium at a cost of about \$10,000, it was learned Wednesday when a letter from Bishop Thomas F. Hickey, asking that the institution sell to the Catholic diocese the ground necessary for such a structure, was read at a meeting of the Board of Managers of the sanatorium. The sum, it is expected, will be donated by a small group of wealthy Catholics. There are approximately 125 Catholic inmates at the sanatorium.
