

### Catholic Women's Club Meet in New Quarters

A. will conduct a card party in the Hotel Seneca for the benefit of the Catholic Women's Club April 28. Tickets are being obtained at the South Street club rooms or at any of the branches of the L. C. B. A.

The formal opening of the new club rooms will take place May 6. A reception will be given for members and friends. The annual dinner of the club will be conducted at Hotel Rochester May 20th.

Mrs. M. H. Keogh, chairman of the Big Sister group of the organization, reported an increase in membership and stated that she was anxious to obtain still more members interested in that type of work.

### Holy Week Services At The Cathedral

Beginning Wednesday afternoon the Tenebrae was sung at St. Patrick's Cathedral by 250 students from St. Bernard's Seminary. The Tenebrae, which consists of numerous psalms and a lesson taken from the Sacred Scriptures, is sung on the afternoons of the Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of Holy Week.

Thursday morning at the Cathedral there were special services assigned to Holy Thursday. According to a custom dating back to the early ages of Christianity only one mass is permitted in each church on this date. At the Cathedral, Bishop Thomas F. Hickey celebrated a penitential mass. The holy oils used during the year in baptism and in administering the sacraments to the dying were consecrated and will later be distributed to the priests of the diocese. Following the mass there was a solemn procession.

Special Easter music will be sung by the Sanctuary Choir of St. Bernard's Seminary and the Boys' and Men's Choir of St. Patrick's Cathedral at the pontifical high mass which will be celebrated at 10:30 o'clock Sunday. The Sanctuary Choir is composed of 250 students of St. Bernard's Seminary under the direction of Rev. John M. Petter, S.T.B. The Boys' and Men's choir is composed of thirty-three boys and eighteen men under the direction of Eugene F. Bonn, organist and director. Michael D. Kavanaugh is assistant director, and Francis E. Bonn, assistant organist.

St. Mary's  
Masses on Easter Sunday will be celebrated at 6, 7, 8:30, 9:30 and Solemn High Mass at 10:45 a. m. The sermon will be given by Rev. Andrew V. Byrne, S. T. B., of St. Bernard's Seminary. After the Mass the congregation will join in singing the hymn, "Holy God, We Praise Thy Name," No. 1.

Sunday evening at 7:45 o'clock Solemn Vespers and Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament will be held.

### Weekly Calendar Of Feast Days

Sunday, April 16.—Easter. The Feast of the Resurrection of Our Lord. St. Optatus and seventeen other holy men who were martyred at Saragossa under Diocian.

Monday, April 17.—St. Anicetus, Pope, who reigned from 165 to 173. He was remarkable for his virtue and fervor.

Tuesday, April 18.—St. Apollonius, a Roman senator, who refused to renounce the Christian faith and was beheaded in 186.

Wednesday, April 19.—St. Elphege, Archbishop of Canterbury, who was captured by the Danes, and, refusing to allow a levy on the poor of his diocese for his ransom, was killed on Easter Sunday, 1012.

Thursday, April 20.—St. Marcellinus, who was born in Africa and preached the faith in Gaul. Gregory of Tours tells of many miracles wrought through his intercession. He died in 374.

Friday, April 21.—St. Anselm, Archbishop of Canterbury, whose episcopacy was a constant struggle against avaricious kings. He is celebrated for his writings and is the first to have introduced the Feast of the Immaculate Conception in the west. He died in 1109.

Saturday, April 22.—St. Soter, Pope and martyr. He succeeded St. Anicetus and vigorously opposed the heresy of Montanus. He governed the church until 177.

### Reverence In Church

One of the distinguished marks between Catholics and our separated brethren is the reverence which we show in church. Not only is the Catholic Church a place wherein to worship God, it is the abiding place of Jesus Christ in the Sacrament of Love. When, therefore, we enter a church, however humble and unpretentious it may be, we forget its poverty and remember only that within its tabernacle dwells the Sovereign Lord of heaven and earth, the God who made all things out of nothing, the Redeemer, who offered up His awful sufferings and death to save our souls from eternal damnation.

Yet, sometimes in church we act as if we forgot in whose presence we are. It is not an uncommon thing to witness people indulging in gossip, smiles, and other indications of levity. In all our churches these regrettable incidents may be witnessed. Ladies in leaving church after Holy Mass gossip and nod to friends while walking down the aisles. . . . Actions like these display gross disrespect for the house of God where only the greatest reverence should be manifested. In the church friends and acquaintances should be ignored. We should come with but one purpose, to adore and glorify God in the Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist, and all persons and worldly affairs should be blotted from the mind. Another unpleasant sight may be frequently observed at the termination of the Mass. A number of people are invariably on their feet, ready to rush out of church even before the priest has left the sanctuary. It would seem as if such people begrudged to God the one hour in the week in which they are bound to serve Him under pain of mortal sin. No Catholic should leave his seat till the priest has departed from the sanctuary. This unseemly haste is not a matter of urgency, for the hurried ones may be later found on the sidewalk, pipe in mouth and deep in baseball or other gossip. Let every Catholic show by his other reverent demeanor in church that there is a strong realization of the presence of Jesus on the altar. Let them wait till the celebrant has left the sanctuary before rushing out from the house of God.—Exchange.

### Holy Week Observed In Dansville Church

Dansville, N. Y. April 14.—This, the holiest week of the year, is solemnized in a special way at St. Mary's church, Dansville, with glorification in the cross of Jesus Christ in whom is Salvation, life and resurrection. The daily masses are offered at 8 o'clock. Reading of the Passion on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday mornings. Commemoration of the Institution of the Blessed Sacrament with a festival mass took place Thursday morning followed by the processional to the repository. Commemoration of the Passion of Christ on Good Friday, the saddest and most solemn day of the week. Mass of the Pre-Sanctified in the morning, adoration of the cross and the exposition of the grave of Christ. Special Meditations and prayers at the Holy Hour service was conducted by the pastor from 2 to 3 o'clock in the afternoon. Saturday morning at 7 o'clock blessing of the new fire, the paschal candle, reading of the twelve prophecies, blessing of the Easter water, followed by mass. From the Gloria Thursday morning until the Gloria Saturday morning the church bell will not ring.
