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
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### Interesting Parish News Weekly Calendar

### Memorial Day Services For Feast Days

Sunday, June 4.—St. Francis of Caracciolo, who was born in the memory of the deceased Knights.

The regular meeting of the Knights Auxiliary, No. 44, Knights of Columbus, were largely attended. Very Rev. Dennis J. Curran, vicar general of the diocese, study for the priesthood. He was educated at the Seminary of Corpus Christi, 1608.

Monday, June 5.—St. Boniface Bishop and Maty, who was born in Devonshire in 680, and received

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Tuesday, June 6.—St. Norbert Bishop, who had been one of the clerics attached to the court of Henry IV, and whose actions became a scandal to his sacred calling.

Being thrown from his horse and seriously injured, he resolved to change his mode of life. He was ordained and began to reform the abuses of his order. He rendered such excellent service that in 1126 he was appointed Bishop of Magdeburg.

Wednesday, June 7.—St. Robert of Newminster. While a monk at Whitby he heard that thirteen religious had been expelled from the Abbey of St. Mary, in York,

for having proposed to restore the strict Benedictine rule. He joined the expelled religious and later became Abbot of a monastery built for them at Newminster. He died in 1239.

Thursday, June 8.—St. Medard, who was chosen Bishop of the Church of France, to which dignity he was consecrated by St. Remigius, who had baptised King Clovis. He died at Noyon in 545.

Friday, June 9.—St. Columba, Abbot and Apostle of the Picts. He was born in Turcunel, Ireland in 521 and when forty years of age went to Scotland where he founded many religious hospitals and converted the Picts, who in gratitude, gave him the island of Iona, where he established his famous monastery. He died in 597.

Saturday, June 10.—St. Margaret of Scotland, the granddaughter of an English king who in 1070 became the bride of Malcolm and who resigned as Queen of Scotland until 1092. She built many churches and monasteries and would not rest until she saw the law of God and his church observed throughout the realm. When, on her deathbed, she received news that her husband and her eldest son had been killed in battle, she thanked God that this last affliction had been sent her as a punishment for her sins.

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
