George Fischer of Rochester Among Those Received

Notre Dame, Ind., July 24. - Notre Dame was the center of most impressive and largely attended ceremonies at 9 o'clock, Thursday morning, July 20th, when thirty-three seminarians and eight brother postulants received the habit of the congregation of Holy Cross and entered upon their novitiate where they joined twenty brother novices who were received but a short while ago.
Among those who received the habit was George B. Fischer of Rochester, N. Y., who completed his college course at Notre Dame University receiving his Ph. B. Dom. Com. last June. At the end of his novitiate training Mr. Fischer will be sent to Holy Cross College, Washington, D. C., or else to Rome for his theological studies in preparation for ordination to the priesthood.
The novitiate of the congregation of Holy Cross is in a most flourishing condition having received sixty-one novices within the past six months.

Had Been Critically Ill for Last Ten Days
Syracuse, N. Y., July 26. - Bishop John Grimes of the diocese of Syracuse, died at 10:10 o'clock to-night after a long period of illness, which has been critical for the last ten days.
At various times since 1913, Bishop Grimes had suffered periodical attacks of a long-standing chronic trouble which ordinarily ran about six weeks before he was able to be out again. He was stricken last month and was compelled to cancel all official engagements including confirmations in various parishes.
Bishop Grimes was born in County Limerick, Ireland, December 18th, 1862, of a family prominent in church affairs. He finished his college course with honors at the age of 18 and came at once to America. He was ordained a priest at Albany, February 10, 1882 - and immediately afterward assigned, as an assistant to St. Mary's Church, Syracuse, now the Cathedral. He was given his first pastorate at Whitesboro in 1887 and two years later was returned to St. Mary's as pastor upon the death of Father O'Hara. In 1904 he was made a member of the Papal household with the rank of Monsignor and on May 16, 1906, was consecrated co-adjutor bishop to Bishop Ludden. On August 6, 1912, Bishop Grimes succeeded to the bishopric on the death of Bishop Ludden.

John J. Ganey, new pastor of this parish, who took up his work here last Sunday. The event took place on the Morgan lawn, across from the church. A program, including speeches, vocal and instrumental music, were followed by refreshments.

Weekly Calendar Of Feast Days

(By N. C. W. C. News Service)
Sunday, July 30. - St. Germainus, Bishop. He was of noble birth and at one time practiced law in Rome and held high office in the imperial army. It was revealed to the Bishop of Auxerre that Germainus was to be his successor and he gave the latter tonsure, almost by main force. Forthwith Germainus became a changed man and devoted all his energies to serving God. He visited England and overcame the Pelagian heresy there. He died in 448 while interceding with the emperor for the people of Brittany.
Monday, July 31. - St. Ignatius Loyola, founder of the Society of Jesus. He was born in Spain in 1491 and served as a courtier and soldier until his thirtieth year. Being wounded, he was called by Divine Grace to leave the world. He won others to God's service and he and his companions placed themselves under the protection of the Pope. Our Lord promised him that the previous heritage of His passion, a heritage of contradictions and persecutions, would never fail his society. Ignatius died in 1556.
Tuesday, August 1. - St. Peter's Chains, commemorating the miraculous delivery of St. Peter by an angel, who cut his chains when he had been imprisoned by Herod.
Wednesday, August 2. - St. Stephen, Pope and Martyr. He was a Roman and elected to the Holy See in 253. He was beheaded in 257. This day is also the feast of St. Alphonsus Liguori, born in Naples, in 1696.
Thursday, Aug. 3. - The Finding of St. Stephen's relics, commemorating the discovery of the body of the first Christian martyr concealed under the ruin of an old tomb twenty miles from Jerusalem. Many miracles attended to the finding of the body, which was transferred to the Church of Sion in Jerusalem.
Friday, August 4. - St. Dominic, founder of the order of Friar Preachers. His eloquent words rescued countless souls and three times raised the dead to life. He died in 1221.
Saturday, Aug. 5. - The Dedication of St. Mary at Nives, one of the three patriarchal churches in Rome, the site of which is declared to have been chosen by the Blessed Virgin by a miraculous snow that fell to earth in the middle of summer.
