Mr. Goldenweiser's analysis is summed up in the following interesting general conclusions:-The number of Catholics in the United States is certainly larger than the number of Catholic their ecclesiastical head. Church members enumerated by the census of religious bodies. This number, 15,721,815, would be increased about 1.400,000 merely through the process of building up the families of church members on the basis of age and sex distribution of the total population of the United States. But even the adjusted figure is clearly incomplete, as there is no reason to-believe that even substantially all the persons belonging to the faith are included among church members By comparing the United States figures with those available for Canada, where both the number of church members and of persons professing each faith **sre available**, the conclusion is reached that Catholics constitute not less than 21 per cent of the population of the United States and that 23,000,000 is a reasonable estimate of their num-
