Sunday the annual Fall Retreat for men and women will open and will continue for eight days during which time Rev. Victor Mills, a Franciscan Father, from Paterson, N. J., will conduct the spiritual exercises. These exercises will consist of evening devotions at 7:30, beginning Sunday night with Rosary, instruction, hymn, Benediction and confessions. Canandaigua, Sept. 27.—The funeral of Rev. Daniel P. Quigley was held from St. Mary's Church at 10 o'clock this morning with Bishop Thomas F. Healey of Rochester, officiating, assisted by a number of visiting priests. Father Quigley died of injuries received by plunging down a two hundred foot gully on the shore of Lake Keuka last week when his sedan was crowded off the road by a truck, the driver of which did not even know that an accident had occurred. He was rector of St. Gabriel's Church at Hammondsport.
