Readers of the Catholic Journal should ponder well the significance of the following New York despatch to the National Catholic Welfare Council's News Service:-

Close to one-half of the graduates of Catholic elementary schools of New York in 1922 entered public high schools and colleges, according to statistics given by Rt. Rev. Monsignor Joseph F. Smith, diocesan superintendent for the New York Archdiocese.

According to Monsignor's report for 1922, which has just been compiled, the number of students who passed from Catholic elementary schools to Catholic high schools and colleges in 1922 was 2,336.

Nearly 100,000 pupils are being educated in the Catholic elementary schools of New York, the total registration being given as 97,360. There are 179 elementary schools under archdiocesan direction, of which 70 are located in Manhattan.
