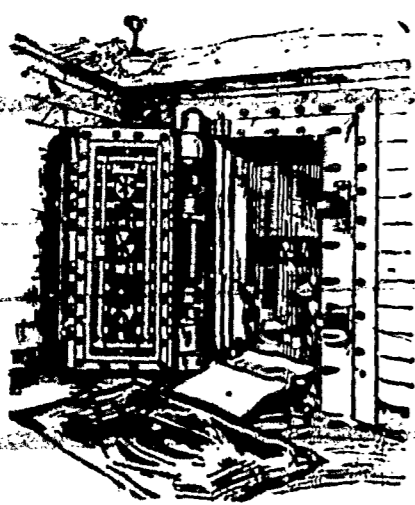

Outdoor Procession Marks Consecration Of Bishop Curley

New York, May 7.—Two Archbishops and more than four hundred monsignori and priests were present in St. Patrick's Cathedral last Tuesday to witness the consecration of the Right Rev. Daniel Joseph Curley as Bishop of Syracuse to succeed the late Right Rev. John Grimes. The Most Rev. Patrick J. Hayes, Archbishop of New York, consecrated the new Bishop and the sermon was preached by the Most Rev. Edward J. Hanna, Archbishop of San Francisco, himself a native of this State. Archbishop Hanna was a close personal friend of the late Rev. John Curley, a brother of Bishop Curley. Father Curley was educated at Rome with the San Francisco prelate.

A large delegation of priests of the Syracuse diocese, headed by Msgr. Albert J. Hayes, who has been administrator since the death of Bishop Grimes, attended the consecration. A delegation of the Syracuse laity and several hundred members of the Church of Our Lady of Solace, of which Bishop Curley was pastor for twenty years, also witnessed the consecration.

The consecration was preceded by the first outdoor procession at the Cathedral since the consecration of the Right Rev. John J. Dunne auxiliary Bishop of New York two years ago. His Grace, Archbishop Hayes was attended by two Knights of St. Gregory, George J. Gillespie and William P. Larkin of this city.

The Right Rev. Thomas J. Walsh of Trenton and the Right Rev. William Turner of Buffalo were the assistant consecrators. Other Bishops who attended the ceremony were the Right Rev. John J. Dunn of New York; Right Rev. Michael J. Hoban of Scranton; Right Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, of Rochester; Right Rev. J. Nolan of Hartford; Right Rev. Joseph J. Conroy of Ogdensburg; Right Rev. Thomas J. Shanahan of the Catholic University; Right Rev. John M. Gannon of Erie; Right Rev. William A. Hickey of Providence; Right Rev. Thomas E. Molloy of Brooklyn; Right Rev. Edward F. Hoban, auxiliary Bishop of Chicago; Right Rev. Ernest Coppe of Australia and Right Rev. Edmund F. Gibbons of Albany.
