**Illinois Catholic
Women May Win Fight
For Eight Hour Day**

Chicago, Ill., May 11.—Aided by Catholic women, working through the numerous Catholic Women's clubs, a bill making it unlawful for an employer to keep a woman or girl at work more than eight hours a day, has been passed by the Illinois House of Representatives. It faces a fight in the Senate.

The bill was introduced by Mrs. Lottie Holman O'Neill, of DuPage county, the only woman member of the Illinois assembly, and was fought by the Illinois Manufacturer's Association and allied organizations of employers. Mrs. O'Neill was supported in her fight by Representative Thomas J. O'Grady of Chicago and other Catholics. The bill passed the house by a vote of 89 to 56.

The Illinois Manufacturer's Association, while insisting that in most of the places where women are employed, an eight-hour day is in force, objected to the establishing of the day by law, on the ground that, if Saturday half holidays were observed it would reduce the week's work and also the wages of women, and would prevent women from working overtime in emergencies.

**"Slay Bigotry Or It
Will Kill America",
Says Noted Minister**

New York, May 10.—The Rev. Dr. S. Parkes Cadman of the Central Congregational Church, Brooklyn, strongly advocated participation by the United States as a leader in world affairs, in an address delivered before a gathering at the West Side Y.M.C.A. During his talk he took occasion to say something about the Ku Klux Klan.

"We shall have to kill this growth of bigotry in this country," he said, referring to the Klan, "or it will slay us. There has been a revival of bigotry since the end of the Civil War. When a man has to put on a mask to carry on any movement he ceases to be an American. He is infamous beyond words."

**Rt. Rev. Curley
Consecrated Bishop
Of Syracuse Diocese**

Syracuse, May 15.—Rt. Rev. Daniel J. Curley, formerly pastor of Our Lady of Solace's Church, New York, was installed as third bishop of Syracuse with an elaborate ceremonial in the Cathedral of Immaculate Conception here today. Hundreds of priests and monsignori as well as Bishop Gibbons of Albany, Bishop Turner of Buffalo, Bishop Hickey of Rochester and Bishop Conroy of Ogdensburg attended the services. Archbishop Patrick J. Hayes of New York, was present and delivered the sermon.

**New Seminary Site
On Tract of 62 Acres
In Baltimore Suburb**

Baltimore, May 14.—The new St. Mary's Seminary, the future home of the historic institution established in 1791, will occupy a site in Roland Park, in the suburbs here last week following the acquisition of a tract of sixty-two acres, bounded on the north by Belvidere Avenue and on the south and west by Deepdene Road and Roland Park.

Plans for a campaign to raise \$1,000,000 for the erection of the new seminary were revealed recently by the Most Rev. Michael J. Curley, Archbishop of Baltimore. The campaign is expected to cover a period of three years and it will probably be that length of time before the complete removal of the institution to its new site is accomplished. The present building, erected in the '70's and '80's, accommodates about 350 students and is inadequate in view of the applications from all parts of the United States and Europe that have been received by the seminary authorities. Many have been denied during the last few years for lack of space.

With the possible exception of the Baltimore Cathedral, no spot in the United States is fraught with Catholic recollections more varied than the present seminary site, where St. Mary's was established in 1791 by four Sulpician priests at the invitation of Bishop Carroll. The Third Plenary Council of Baltimore was held within the seminary walls. From time to time various buildings have been replaced, but the old chapel, which was dedicated by Bishop Carroll in 1808, still stands. Removal of the chapel for the new site is included in plans for the future of the institution; it is understood.

Thirty members of the hierarchy, including Cardinal Gibbons, were educated at St. Mary's, which has furnished more than 2,000 priests to the Church in this country.

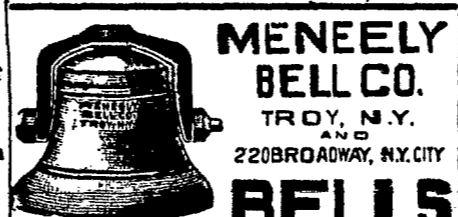
