Cleveland Church Consecration Marked By \$10,000 Present

Cleveland, June 1.—St. Thomas Aquinas Church, Superior avenue and Ansel road was consecrated by Bishop Joseph Schrembs on the morning of May 30. Bishop Chartrand of Indianapolis and Bishop Stritch of Toledo were assistant prelates. Rev. John Cavanaugh, C.S.C., former president of Notre Dame University preached the sermon. St. Thomas' is one of the largest parishes in the city. It was established in 1898 by Rev. Thomas F. Mahon who has remained as its pastor throughout. The occasion also included observance of the silver jubilee of Father Mahon's pastorate.

The Church was enlarged, remodeled and beautified within the last year at an expense of \$100,000, and at a meeting held in the evening a purse of \$10,000 was presented to Father Mahon, who will leave for a trip to Europe and the Holy Land about the middle of the month.

Father Lasance Asks Prayer As His Reward

Radio Sermons Play Havoc With Church Attendance

New York, June 4.—Radio broadcasting, still in its infancy, is already beginning to play havoc with church attendance, according to Episcopal Bishop William R. Stearly, who refers to the radio as "another ally of those forces that make it more difficult to get people to go to church."

"Why go to your parish church?" decried Bishop Stearly, "when you can sit at ease in your parlor and hear the music of a choir and be charmed by the eloquence of a magnetic preacher? The habit of church-going has a hard time in the face of Sunday excursions, movies, sacred concerts, automobiling and broadcasting."

It is pointed out that Cardinal Dubois of Paris recently called attention to the fact that while the radio may convey the preacher's words with perfect fidelity to his invisible audience, it cannot transmit the vital factor, his personality and his magnetism. The metallic effect, the Cardinal said, robs the words of much of their fervor.

Crusade Convention To Be Made Notable By Costume Parade

Notre Dame, Ind., June 4.—An army of modern Crusaders, clad as of old in the grab of guides, hermits, saneschals and other mystic heroes of history, will sweep through the streets of Notre Dame on the occasion of the fourth general convocation of the Catholic Students' Mission Crusade, which is to be held here August 9 to 12.

The convention will mark for the first time the execution of the Crusade ordinal, which has been conceived and written by the Rev. Anselm Keefe of the Catholic University and which is destined to take its place beside the great crusade pageant "God Wills It", written by Daniel J. Lord, S. J.

Thousands of Crusaders will take part in the ordinal ceremonial. A long flowing gown with a cape-like hood for head and shoulders, all in white except for the cap's scarlet cross and azure shield, will mark each wearer of the seal of the new Crusade. The costume has been designed particularly for the ceremonial and the women Crusaders of Cincinnati are busily plying needles and feeding yards after yard of cloth into their sewing machines making ready the tunics and gowns that are to be worn at the ceremonial. Trumpets, torches and crosses are being prepared at Notre Dame.

The Crusade slogan is "Notre Dame To Defend the Cross" and with this as the motto a series of attractive posters is being distributed throughout various Crusade units with a view to rallying the Catholic young men and young women of the nation for the cause of Christ and the Cross. Meanwhile the campaign for the enrollment of new units is being pushed rapidly and all but nine dioceses of the United States are now represented in the field.

Catholic Charities Of N. Y. Receive \$25,000
