Priest Produces "Spirit Pictures" In Magazine Test

New York, June 11.—Father de Heredia, the Jesuit, author of "Spiritism and Common Sense," is in great demand these days to produce "spirit" pictures for the various scientific magazines. He has spent his spare time, apart from his priestly duties, investigating spiritism and has followed it not so much with the mind of a scientist as with the uncomplicated logic of a boy, for that is the way, to strip spiritism of the frauds commonly practiced in its name.

In a recent demonstration for the Popular Mechanics Magazine, Father de Heredia, showed how "spirit pictures" could be made under "test" conditions so that the closest observer could not detect how it was done. Using the Magazine's own equipment, including cameras, plates and chemicals, numerous "spirit" views were produced even to the white cloud of "ectoplasm" commonly associated with them.

The priest clips his "ghosts" a beautiful child, a gliding figure, a line of marching soldiers, an aged woman—from foreign periodicals. He always has a supply with their surfaces washed with luminous paint and freshly exposed to the light. A sitter enters the studio. Perhaps fearing fraud he has even brought his own camera. He examines everything relating to his mission. Father de Heredia refuses to use the plates until the subject has written his name on them to insure that no shifting can be done.

The Jesuit watches him sign the plate, his own hand, in the palm of which is the paint-treated spirit picture—resting lighting on one corner. The plate is then placed in the camera by the subject himself, who may even press the bulb. The sitter is eager. He insists on developing and printing the plate immediately. His eagerness increases. The print is still wet, but there-unmistakably—is not only his own likeness, but that of the aged mother for whom no normal person ever ceases to yearn.

"Man's Guesses" Peer Guide In Religion

New York, June 11.—"The devil has a campaign on in New York. He is trying to make it appear that Christianity is something that every teacher can reconstruct to suit himself," remarked Don O. Shelton, president of the National Bible Institute in an address here recently. "From the beginning Christianity has been misrepresented.

The warfare now is not primarily with the application of Christian truth but against the historic facts of Christianity and man's guesses and inventions. And this contest is planned and conducted by ministers and theologians who are inside the churches. Some of these appear to be so elated over their anti-Christian views that they put bells on themselves. The situation is astonishing."

Monsignor Mackin At 85 Years Starts New Parish School

Washington, D. C., June 18.—Eighty-five years old this month, the Right Rev. Monsignor James F. Mackin, pastor of St. Paul's Church, will celebrate his birthday by participating in exercises for the laying of the cornerstone of the new St. Paul's School, a project involving the expenditure of \$200,000. Monsignor Fumasoni-Biondi, the Apostolic Delegate, will preside at the exercises, which will be held Sunday, July 1.

Monsignor Mackin has undertaken the work of erecting and financing the parish school with the enthusiasm of a man less than half his years. Already there stand as monuments to his zeal and energy the handsome St. Paul's Church and a smaller schoolhouse, now pressed for accommodations. His one dream is to see the new school completed and a substantial part of the debt paid off before his death.

The veteran prelate has been pastor of St. Paul's since 1886. Previous to that and following his ordination in 1868, he was assistant at St. Matthew's Parish in this city, and pastor of St. Mary's Church, Rockville. His first task on assuming the pastorate of St. Paul's was the erection of a chapel and schoolhouse at a cost of \$13,000. Later he built the present parish rectory at a cost of \$6,000 and in 1892 the cornerstone for the present St. Paul's Church was laid by Cardinal Gibbons.

Originally there were 300 Catholics in the parish and 40 children in the parish school. Today there are close to 4000 souls and 200 children being educated. Many distinguished statesmen, including U. S. Senators, and foreign ambassadors have been members of the parish. Admiral William S. Benson is now a member, being a former president of St. Paul's Council, N. C. C. M.

The site of the present school was occupied until recently by a public playground which Monsignor Mackin had given over to the children of the District of Columbia.

Monsignor Mackin will celebrate his birthday on June 29 and the laying of the cornerstone will take place two days later. Patrick J. Haltigan, president of the Archdiocesan Council of the Holy Name Societies will preside.

Lay Activities Interest Irish Truth Society

Dublin, June 4.—The opportunities and activities of layman will be dealt with in no fewer than nine papers at the next conference of the Catholic Truth Society. The inaugural address will be on "The Catholic Layman" delivered by Sir Joseph Glynn, dead of the National Health Insurance Department.

Other papers will discuss "The Catholic Layman in Business", "The Catholic Layman in Church Services", "The Catholic Layman in the Labor Movement".

The part taken by Catholic women in social service and in the Labor movement will form the subject of separate papers.

According to the provisional arrangements nine of the Irish Bishops will participate in the Conference.

The close study of lay action, which is such a feature of the program, has been suggested by the organization and growth of Catholic lay activity in America.
