

Popular N. Y. Priest Injured When Auto Runs Up Sidewalk

New York, July 10.—The Rev. Father T. E. Gilmartin, pastor of St. Peter and St. Paul's Church, East 159th Street and St. Ann's Avenue, while talking with a friend on the sidewalk at 163rd Street and Third Avenue a few days ago, was seriously hurt when an automobile jumped the curb and knocked them both down. Father Gilmartin was taken to St. Francis Hospital with an injured left arm and possible internal injuries. Charles P. Hilderbrand, the friend who was talking with Father Gilmartin, was able to go to his home after being treated for abrasions.

Up to a year ago, Father Gilmartin was rector of St. Columba's Church, at Chester, N. Y. Previous to that he was assistant pastor under Msgr. Matthew A. Taylor at the Church of the Blessed Sacrament, 71st Street and Broadway. He had served as a chaplain in the Spanish-American war. Father Gilmartin, who was a classmate of Archbishop Hayes and was ordained with him, celebrated the twentieth anniversary of his ordination on May 30.

Father Gilmartin has been a very active priest, and popular with both clergy and laity. He became rector of St. Peter and St. Paul's Church after the death of the Rev. Thomas F. Duffy.

FORGET DEBY TO CERVANTES

Residents of Town Immortalized by Great Writer Have Voted to Change Its Name.

The inhabitants of the little Spanish village of Puerto Lopeche, disdainful of the fact that Cervantes immortalized their town in "Don Quixote," now desire to change its name.

The question was submitted to a vote of the inhabitants and it was decided that Puerto Lopeche should hereafter be called Puerto de San Juan, in honor of the order of St. John, which elevated that district in the Middle Ages.

Several Spanish newspapers have expressed their great indignation at this attitude, reminding the villagers of their obligation to the great Cervantes and apparently the people of Puerto Lopeche remain entirely unmoved by such literary arguments, declaring that Puerto de San Juan sounds better than Puerto Lopeche. That, they believe, is the prime consideration.

It has been observed that in other cases the inhabitants of places made famous by great writers do not always appreciate the honor bestowed upon them. Witness the good people of Rome, who certainly have no great reason for boasting of Alphonse Daudet, or the Parisians, Paris, named for the Kansas City Star.)

Anton Lang To Attend Ordination Of An American Jesuit

Innsbruck, July 9.—The Rev. Bernard R. Hubbard, S. J., a native of San Francisco, Cal., is to be ordained in the old Jesuit church at Innsbruck, in the Tyrolean Alps, on July 29, the first of the American Jesuits to be ordained at Innsbruck since before the war. Father Hubbard will sing his first solemn High Mass on the feast of St. Ignatius, July 31, at Innsbruck. The Rev. Robert Sweickerath, S. J., the distinguished Jesuit author and pedagogist, will be the deacon of honor.

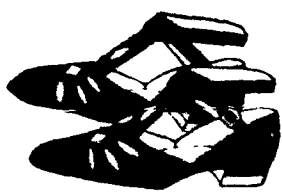
A special feature of the occasion will be the presence of Mr. and Mrs. Anton Lang, of Oberammergau, who, with three other members of the cast of the Passion Play, will pay tribute to Father Hubbard for his courageous defense of them and of the Play, a year ago, when malicious propaganda charging all sorts of false motives to the Oberammergau players was being circulated in the European press. With Mr. Lang will come those who played the parts of St. Peter, St. John and Judas, all of whom are personal friends of the California Jesuit.

The responses at the Mass will be sung by the blind children of Innsbruck and the children of the local orphan asylum.

The Countess Provana, who is an American girl and the wife of a distinguished member of the Italian diplomatic corps, will give a dinner in honor of Father Hubbard at her residence in Innsbruck.

Father Hubbard will remain in Europe for two years to complete his theological studies and to continue the work of the distribution of the American Relief funds, which have been placed at his disposal. He taught for a number of years as a Jesuit scholastic in California and is a specialist in geology and an amateur photographer of marked attainments.

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Tertiaries To Hold Provincial Meeting In St. Louis Oct. 7-9

St. Louis, Mo., July 13.—The Rev. Constantine Bach, O. F. M., spiritual director of the Sacred Heart Tertiary Province, or Third Order of St. Francis, the headquarters of which are at St. Anthony's Church here, has announced that the third convention of the Sacred Heart Tertiary Province will be held in St. Louis, October 7, 8 and 9. The Sacred Heart Tertiary province was organized six years ago, when the first convention was held at Tautopolis, Ill., three years ago the second convention was held at Chicago.

There are about 45 fraternities or branches of the Third Order in the Sacred Heart Province, which are in about 34 cities, among these being St. Louis, Chicago, Cleveland, Indianapolis, St. Paul, Omaha, Quincy, Duquesne, Sioux City, Petoskey, Mich., and Superior, Wis. Delegates from all the branches are expected to attend the October convention, arrangements for which are in charge of Father Constantine. The chief matter for the convention's consideration probably will be the preparation of a program for helping the Indian Missions, particularly those of New Mexico and Arizona, and likewise the missions in China.

One feature of the convention will be a mass meeting in the auditorium of St. Louis University on October 7, another will be a Mission Exhibit at St. Anthony's for the showing of articles made by members of the Third Order fraternities in aid of missions, such as altar linens, vestments, etc. The convention will begin with a solemn Mass in St. Anthony's Church on Sunday, October 7.

Catholic Daughters Elect Officers At Annual Convention

Larkin, New York City.

New Scholarship For Catholic Labor College At Oxford

London, July 9.—Liverpool members of the Catholic Social Guild are raising among themselves a scholarship of the annual value of \$600, for the maintenance of a second Liverpool student at the Catholic Workers' College, which is conducted at Oxford under the auspices of the Catholic Social Guild and the Oxford Jesuits at Campion Hall. Members of the Catholic Workers' College are not members of the university, in the sense of being undergraduates. Their course of study is a special one, adapted to their particular needs, and includes moral philosophy, apologetics, history, economics, public administration, town planning and housing.

A movement is on foot to provide a similar college for Catholic women, and this may possibly be opened to receive students when the new academic year opens in the fall.

WEEKLY CHURCH CALENDAR

Sunday, July 22.—St. Mary Magdalen, whom Jesus raised from a life of sin to take her place among the Saints of the Church. She was one of the family "whom Jesus so loved" that he raised her brother Lazarus from the dead. She stood with the Blessed Virgin and St. John at the foot of the Cross. When the faithful were scattered by persecution it is said, she found refuge in a cave in Provence where she lived for thirty years.

Monday, July 23.—St. Appollinaris, bishop and martyr, was the first Bishop of Ravenna. He won his martyr's crown during the reign of Vespasian. He was a disciple of St. Peter.

Tuesday, July 24.—St. Christina, virgin and martyr, was cruelly tortured because she destroyed some golden idols belonging to her father who was a rich and powerful pagan magistrate. She was miraculously preserved from death on several occasions but finally was martyred at Tyro, a city which formerly stood on an island in the lake of Bolsena.

Wednesday, July 25.—St. James, Apostle, was one of the three chosen to be familiar companions of Our Saviour. When he was accused and brought before Herod Agrippa, his fearless confession of Jesus so moved the public prosecutor that he declared himself a Christian on the spot. Accused and accused were there upon both killed.

Thursday, July 26.—St. Anne was chosen by God to become the mother of the Blessed Virgin. The Saint was far advanced in age when Mary was born, the fruit rather of grace than of nature. In gratitude, St. Anne vowed her daughter to God and when Mary was three years old Anne and her spouse, St. Joseph, took the child to the Temple and watched her pass into the inner sanctuary and then saw her no more.

Friday, July 27.—St. Pantaleon, martyr, during one period of his life was led into apostasy by a belief in false maxims of the world. Later, however, he was again converted. He distributed all his goods to the poor and shortly thereafter met his death for the Faith.

Saturday, July 28.—St. Nazarius was the son of a pagan officer in the Roman army. He embraced the faith of his mother Perpetua. Arriving at Milan he was beheaded together with Celsus, a youth whom he took with him on his travels. These martyrs suffered during the first persecution under Nero.

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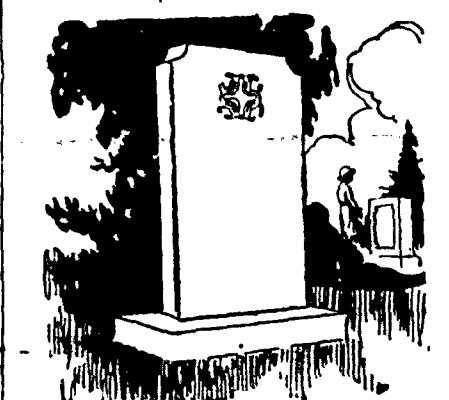
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
