


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Our Lady of Lourdes Church Dedicate Its Lourdes Shrine

The replica of the shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes which has just been completed in Our Lady of Victory Church in Pleasant street, was formally dedicated Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock. The sermon was preached by Rev. Andrew Byrne, of St. Bernard's Seminary, and was followed by the benediction of the Blessed Sacrament. The new shrine is presented by Leon Lampert in memory of his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Leon Lampert. The Rev. Camiel A. Van der Meulen is temporarily in charge.

The new shrine is copied from the celebrated Lady of Lourdes shrine in Tarbes, France. The central figure is that of the Virgin Mary holding the crucified body of Jesus, known as the "Pietas." In a natural niche in the rock above this grotto is a statue of the Virgin Mother in white marble, with blue sash, a gold rosary over her right arm and roses on the toe of each foot. At the right of the grotto, against the casing or frame, which forms a chapel entrance, is a statue of St. Ann. A relic of St. Ann some time ago was presented to the French church here by the priests of St. Anne Beupre in Canada.

Rev. Alphonse A. Notebaert, rector of Our Lady of Victory Church, who has been in Belgium for several weeks, is booked to sail from Havre on the French liner Lafayette and he expects to arrive in Rochester on August 26. Father Notebaert was benefited greatly when he visited the Lady of Lourdes shrine in France in 1882, when in ill health.

The attendance averaged 192 for the six weeks. The make-up classes, attended by boys and girls from many of the parishes, were conspicuously successful, it was said. Many who failed in one or more subjects received high marks in their final examinations at the summer school, and will be enabled to re-enter their classes in September on an equal footing with the other pupils of the grade.

St. Lucy Church Plans Three-Day St. Rocco Fete

The annual celebration in honor of Saint Rocco, in which the members of the Italian colony of the city are invited to participate, will be held for three days, beginning Saturday, Aug. 18th, at the Church of St. Lucy in Troup street.
