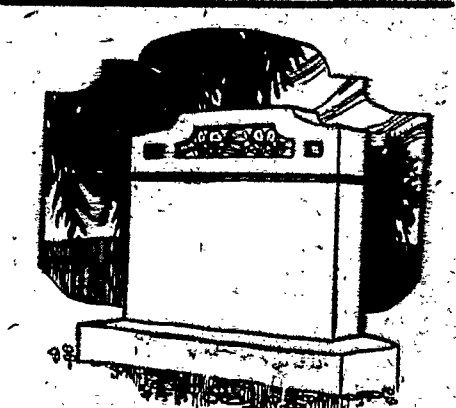

### Catholic Summer School

Cliff Haven, N. Y. Thursday August 23rd. The eighth week of Cliff Haven was made very interesting because of the splendid lectures by Charles G. Fenwick, Ph. D., Professor of Economics and Politics, Bryn Mawr College, Pa., and lectures by Joseph I. Breen, Ph. D., of the N.C.W.C., two song recitals by Miss Kathleen O'Brien of Providence, R. I., and two dramatic readings by Miss Rose Walsh, of Franklin, Mass.

Right Rev. Joseph H. Coaroy, D. D., D. D., Bishop of Ogdensburg Diocese, made a special visit to the Catholic Summer School last Sunday and officiated at the nine thirty Mass. Rev. William Quinn of the Propagation of the Faith preached at the ten thirty Mass.

The Grand Annual Concert was held Sunday night under the direction of Miss Agnes Clune Quinlan, Director of Music at the Catholic Summer School.

Mr. Louis Chartier of New York, sang both English and French songs with great feeling; Miss Josephine Emerson, rendered several violin classics. Miss Agnes Clune Quinlan, of Philadelphia, accompanied Miss Emerson and Mr. Alvares Cerda, Cellist, also Mr. Cerda gave a Cello Solo that was very beautiful and pleasing. In concluding the program, was a trio by Miss Quinlan, Miss Emerson, and Mr. Cerda. The annual Concert was surely one of the best ever given at Cliff Haven, and much was due to the untiring efforts of Miss Quinlan who made all arrangements, seeing to every detail.

Monday afternoon Rev. William Quinn, formerly of the Indian Missions, now Secretary of the Propagation of the Faith in the United States, gave a Round Table Talk in the auditorium. Father Quinn spoke of the organization whose work he is so splendidly doing, and answered questions of the Summer Schoolers.

### Six French Nuns Get Honor Medal From Government

Paris, August 11.—The Prefect of the Department of la Manche recently went to the hospital of Saint-Lo to present the Medal of Honor to two nuns on behalf of the Minister of Labor. He delivered a brief address in which he expressed his satisfaction at being able to accomplish such a mission in the name of the Government. He then spoke in terms of the highest praise of all the nuns who are devoting themselves to the care of children, the aged and the sick of every kind. "What sacrifices," he said, "what fatigue, what care their work requires! Assuredly all are deserving of praise, but sometimes there are some who have rendered exceptional services, either because of the difficulties they have had to meet or because of the length of their services. The Government is happy to be able to give them a special mark of its gratitude."
