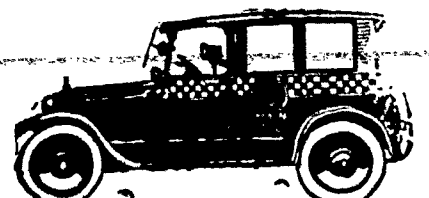

Iris the Poor Man's Orchid.

In Greek, from whence it came, the name means rainbow. In the United States it is often spoken of as the poor man's orchid. There are fully 100 species in cultivation, with varieties almost without number. The flowers of different classes do not all bloom at the same time, however, by choosing different kinds it is possible to have a long season.

Aquinas Institute Plans Campaign

The big drive in the Aquinas Institute campaign for \$650,000, with which to build and equip a new Catholic High School in Rochester, began at St. Joseph's Hall Wednesday night when the Executive Committee, met and formally prepared the plans for raising the money. Charles F. Shay, pastor of the church, chairman, made an appeal for the support of the parishes in the campaign and outlined the purposes of the drive.

The Executive Committee is composed of the pastor of each church in the district and three laymen of each of the parishes, which gives a membership of 180 members, and all members of the parish. In addition to the Executive Committee each parish in the Rochester diocese is divided into districts in church walls, marking the spots which parish teams will work. There will be at least ten men to a team in most parishes the teams will create. These candles will burn at number twenty, providing a force of every solemn service for eight days more than 5,000 candles.

John Connors was chairman of Wednesday night's meeting and took a roll-call of the parishes. Each parish chairman reported on what his particular parish has accomplished in organization for this campaign.

Distribution of literature to the day was accomplished and on Sunday more than 64,000 letters will be passed out in the churches to the 100,000 people to whom the appeal is to be made. Large posters will be placed in the church vestibules to attract attention to the cause.

A master list will be kept at the headquarters of the Executive Committee so that all work can be done by districts. The women members of the church will be used in the manner best fitted to the requirements of each parish.

The Executive Committee will be assisted by the officers of the campaign and an Advisory Committee of one hundred members. Eugene J. Dwyer is honorary chairman of the Advisory Committee.

DR. E. W. RYAN, FAMOUS HUMANITARIAN WORKER DIES AT 89 IN PERSIA

Washington, Sept. 28.—Dr. Edward W. Ryan, internationally known for his services with the American Red Cross in which organization he held the rank of Colonel, died at Teheran, Persia, according to a cablegram received here by the State Department. His death was ascribed to a heart attack coming at a time when he was in a weakened condition due to malarial fever. Dr. Ryan was in Persia, under the authority of the Persian Government directing the installation of modern methods of municipal sanitation and disease prevention.

Although only thirty-nine years old Dr. Ryan's career included service in all parts of the world in the interests of the relief of human suffering. He was born in Scranton, Pa., and received his early education in the schools of that city. Later he was graduated from Fordham University receiving his baccalaureate degree and afterwards entering the medical school from which he was graduated in 1912. In Mexico, Serbia, Russia, the Baltic states and in France, he was engaged in humanitarian work as an agent of the American Red Cross. Many governments honored him with decorations. France made him a member of the Legion of Honor and conferred upon him the Croix de Guerre, and the Medaille des Epidemics. Serbia made him a commander of the Order of the White Eagle, a member of the Order of St. Sava and bestowed upon him the Charity Cross and the Serbian Red Cross; he was a member of the Montenegrin Order of St. Danilo, the Greek Order of the Savior, the Finnish Order of St. Rose, the Russian Orders of St. Ann and St. Stanislaw, the Estonian Order of Liberty and the Order of Lithuania.
