

**Appointed Pastor At Seneca Falls**

Bishop Thomas F. Hickey announced the appointment of Rev. Bartholomew L. Quirk last week as pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Seneca Falls, to succeed the late Rev. Michael U. Dwyer.

St. Patrick's parish of Seneca Falls is one of the older parishes of the diocese and has a rectory, convent and parochial school. The congregation is a substantial and growing one, St. Patrick's being the only Catholic Church in the village.

Born in Auburn, Father Quirk received his early education in St. Mary's parochial school from which he was graduated to high school and from there to St. Andrew's Preparatory Seminary, Rochester. From St. Andrew's he was graduated to St. Bernard's Theological Seminary, where he spent the regular course studying for the priesthood. He was ordained to the priesthood in St. Patrick's Cathedral on June 6th, 1914, by Bishop Hickey, who also gave him his first appointment as assistant at Holy Rosary Church in this city on June 19th, 1914. After remaining for eight years at Holy Rosary, he was promoted to the assistant of St. Patrick's Church at Seneca Falls on July 5th, 1922, the pastorate of which he will assume at once.
