Iowa City, June 2.—A plea for "sane nationalism" was voted by the Rev. Dr. John A. Ryan, Professor of Sociology of the Catholic University of America, in his baccalaureate sermon to the graduating class of Iowa State University here yesterday. He warned against a "too ardent pursuit of 'pure internationalism' which would be open to the same criticism as the present law. In the past, the law has been amended many times, but the result has been a business situation which is not a business situation. Necessary, likewise, is the sentiment of national patriotism. But our patriotism should be rational. It should exclude all racialism, all worship of country as a nationalistic abstraction, and every other element of nationalism which is at variance with the moral law and the Golden Rule.

Model Sanatorium  
Opened at Asheville  
By Sisters of Mercy

Asheville, N. C., May 31.—Asheville has one of the finest and most completely equipped institutions for the treatment of tubercular patients in the country, in the St. Joseph Sanatorium, the enlarged plant of which has just been formally opened here. It is conducted by the Sisters of Mercy. The formal opening marked the completion of a new wing and a central administration building. In the expansion, every known modern device that would make for the perfection of the institution was installed. The entire plant is fireproof, and ventilation, plumbing, etc., were planned on the latest lines. New electrical devices include silent nurse signals and telephone communication, on an inter-communicating system, for each room. A complete X-Ray plant has been installed, a dental laboratory, operating rooms and a chemical testing laboratory. The complete equipment has been acquired with a view to making it unnecessary for a patient to leave the hospital for any kind of special treatment.

ST. DOMINIC SISTERS  
LOSE FIGHT ON TAXES

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Trenton, N. J., May 31.—The tax case in which the Sisters of the Order of St. Dominic contested the legality of an assessment of \$19,425 for 1923 against their property at Sea Island City has been decided against the Order by the New Jersey Supreme Court. The decision is expected to have an important bearing on similar cases in New Jersey and other states. The Sisters conduct the institution at Sea Island City as a vacation point for members of the order. The ruling states that the payment of a weekly board fee by the Sisters removes it from the category of charitable institutions entitled to tax exemption. The Cape May County Tax Board and the State Board of Taxes and Assessment previously had upheld the tax.

Cardinal Logue  
Discusses Irish  
Boundary Dispute

Dublin, May 24.—Although there has been much discussion on the subject, nothing definite has yet been done to put the Boundary Article of the Anglo-Irish Treaty into operation. The Belfast Parliament of the six Northern counties defies the authority of the British Government and Imperial Parliament. It now rests with the latter to assert their authority over the subordinate Legislature. Sir James Craig, the Premier of the Belfast Government states that the dispute is one which can and should be settled between himself and Mr. Cosgrave, President of the Executive Council in the twenty-six counties. This gesture by Sir James Craig is regarded as mere playacting. Conferences have been already held with the object of effecting a settlement by agreement, but they all proved abortive. The situation, as it stands, is well summed up by His Eminence, Cardinal Logue, who says: "There is not the slightest chance of settlement by agreement. The free State have kept their side of the bargain faithfully. Let England keep hers. The machinery is provided in the treaty. If the Belfast politicians refuse to appoint a commissioner as provided in the treaty, it is England's duty to appoint one. The Cardinal deplors the religious animities among the people of Ulster which have, he says, been accentuated in late years by political quarrels."

Rome, May 20.—The appeal sent out from the Central Committee for the Holy Year to the bishops of the world has been favorably received, and offerings are beginning to arrive from members of the Hierarchy throughout the world for the gold hammer and trowel which will be used by the Holy Father in opening the Holy Door of the Basilica of St. Peter's. Win Essay Contests

C., May 30.—Out of six prize winners in the District of Columbia division of the American Chemical Society's essay contest, three are Catholic students of Notre Dame Academy here. In addition, four of the five who received honorable mention in the contest also are students at the academy. The Chemical Society awards six prizes of \$20 each for the six best essays in each state and in the District of Columbia. Six scholarships to Yale or Vassar are the national awards. Contestants were required to write 2,500-word essays on one of six subjects. The contest was made possible through the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Francis P. Garvan, of New York City. Mr. Garvan is a prominent Catholic layman.

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Shortage of Priests  
In England Is Felt  
In All of Dioceses

London, May 23.—All the English dioceses are suffering from a short- shortage of priests as the result of the war, during which clerical students were called to the colors. The Bishop of Southwark now comments on the shortage in a pastoral letter. "We lost many promising vocations by the army," he says, "and the studies of all were retarded. And now, in the time of our urgent need, we find ourselves unbrothered by a magnificent papal mandate to supply priests for the work, tie for the opening ceremonies. The winning essay was based on a bell, now in actual service at Columbia which was ordered by Bishop Loras, the early French prelate of Dubuque, for St. Bernard's seminary, in 1850. A prize of \$50 will be awarded by the college for the best history of Columbia college between the years of 1914 and 1924.

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
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
