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Non-Catholic Help

Even the non-Catholics begin to realize that the Klan must be driven out else the very existence of this Republic as a haven of religious liberty is threatened.

In the State of Washington the non-Catholics have organized the "Friends of Educational Freedom" to combat the movement to abolish parochial schools in that state.

At a recent state convention of the Knights of Columbus the principal address was delivered by Hon. Clarence A. Reames, a thirty-second degree Mason, who said in part:—

"Catholics of the state of Washington are not alone in the fight against the initiative No. 49, which is proposed to destroy private and parochial schools; hundreds of

Masons will ask no higher privilege than to give of their efforts and of their time and of their money to defeat this iniquitous, false and unfair bill, which is subversive of constitutional guarantees and aimed at the liberty of our country

"When the American boy marches off to war," said Mr. Reames, "I do not ask of him as a test of his patriotism or usefulness whether he

is a Protestant or a Catholic. The only test asked was: 'Are you willing and ready to serve your country—

There are thousands of crosses marking the graves of the boys overseas. Catholic and Protestant boys alike who responded.

"After having gone through this experience and after the terrible lessons of the past we thought we had the right to expect the end of the war of religious prejudice.

"The initiative No. 49, aimed at the destruction of all private and parochial schools, carries a lie and falsehood in every line and in every phrase. They call it a compulsory school law. It is not. It won't send one child to school who is not going to school now.

"Initiative No. 49 would deprive the parent of the God-given, inalienable right to select the school for his children; it would destroy lifetime work that has been put into private and parochial schools, which have helped build the nation.

"Private and parochial schools teach the same subjects as public schools; the children are taught to reverence the same flag and follow approved courses.

"A secret organization is advancing the cause of this iniquitous measure against some of our best institutions in the spirit of prejudice and hate. It is the only secret organization that I know of in the United States that is not willing to

show its face. The only organization that employs such a method is the K. K. K. I know of no other organization that employs such a method.

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Good Work

Red-blooded men everywhere will applaud the determined stand taken by Rev. Dr. Kettel, in the Monroe County convention of the American Legion which results in the convention's unqualified condemnation and repudiation of the Klu Klux Klan and all it stands for.

How could the Legion do otherwise, made up of men who were asked no questions as to their race or religion when they were ordered to the front to face cannon shot and shell making the world free of autocratic control?

The surprise is that any effort should have been made to elude the action or to so amend the resolution that it would have meant nothing specific. These chaps did not fall out of line because their marching companion was a Catholic or a Jew. They fought side by side in the days of war. Why should they not sit side by side in the days of peace?

Kicked Out

Following the decision of the Federal Courts that the Oregon anti-Catholic school law is unconstitutional, the decent citizens of the State apparently, have united to crush out the sub-cellular Klan.

The bigots made a concerted drive to defeat for renomination Representative Nicholas J. Sennett, a Catholic. They met ignominious defeat.

Two Catholics who were defeated for nomination as state senator two years ago were nominated this year in the same districts.

M. E. Crumpacker only candidate who refused to subscribe to the Klan propaganda was nominated over two candidates who accepted Klan support.

Evidently, the thinking men of Oregon have come to realize that Klan supremacy would drive away from the state many enterprises and prospective settlers who refuse to be throttled and deprived of their religious liberties and civil rights.

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WEEKLY CALENDAR OF FEAST DAYS

Sunday, June 15.—Sts. Vitus, Crescentia, and Modestus, Martyrs. St. Vitus was a child of noble parents who was instructed in the Faith by his Christian nurse Crescentia and her husband Modestus. To escape the persecution of his pagan father and the city authorities, Vitus and his companions fled to Italy where they received the crown of martyrdom during the persecution of Diocletian.

Monday, June 16.—St. John Francis Regis, was a member of the Society of Jesus, who during the twelve years in which he preached the gospel brought many thousands to the Faith. He died in 1641.

Tuesday, June 17.—St. Avitus, a native of Orleans, retired into Auvergne and took the monastic habit in the Abbey of Menat. Later he became abbot of Micy but resigned to gain greater seclusion. He lived for a time as a recluse in Dunois where a church was built for him and his companions by King Clovis. The saint died about the year 530.

Wednesday, June 18.—Sts. Marcus and Marcellianus, Martyrs, twin brothers of an illustrious family in Rome were killed during the persecution under Diocletian. While in prison awaiting execution they succeeded in converting their parents and their wives together with several public officials.

Thursday, June 19.—St. Juliana Falconieri, received the habit of the Servants of Mary from the hands of St. Philip Benizi. Her sanctity attracted many novices and for their guidance she was bidden to draw up a rule. Thus she became the foundress of the "Mantellate". She died in 1349 after a lingering and painful illness.

Friday, June 20.—St. Silverius, Pope and Martyr, was the son of Pope Hermisdas, who had been married before he entered the priesthood. Chosen Pope on the death of St. Agapetus, Silverius was driven from Rome through the enmity of the Empress Theodora. He was banished to Patara in Lycia where the Bishop received him with great honor and interceded for him with the Emperor. The latter ordered him restored to Rome but through the machinations of his enemies the Saint was landed on a desert island where he died in 538.

Saturday, June 21.—St. Aloysius Gonzaga, son of Ferdinand Gonzaga, Marquis of Castiglione, at the age of nine made a vow of perpetual virginity and by a special grace was ever exempted from temptations against purity. He entered the Society of Jesus and during his last year of theology when a fever broke out in Rome offered himself for service to the sick. He contracted the disease and died after an illness of three months.
