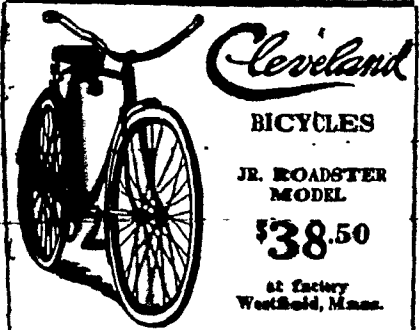

Bishop Hickey Celebrates Annual Field Mass AT Cemetery

The annual field mass of the Knights of St. John, was held Sunday morning at Holy Sepulchre cemetery. The mass was celebrated at a temporary altar in the eastern end of the cemetery by the Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, assisted by the Rev. John P. Schellhorn, the Rev. J. Francis O'Hern, the Rev. J. Emil Gefell, the Rev. A. B. Meehan and the Rev. John Liebert of St. Bernard's Seminary and the Rev. John Sipple of Philadelphia. The Knights of St. John Choral Society sang the eucharistic parts of the mass, under the direction of Professor Fred C. Phil, organist of St. Michael's Church. Bishop Hickey delivered a sermon at the conclusion of the mass in which he spoke of the fact that to praise God and to honor and pray for the dead are signs of true nobility. The bishop was escorted to the cemetery from St. Bernard's Seminary by Colonel Joseph H. Weis and his personal staff with Brigadier Generals Frank H. Biel and George E. Noth. The number of graves decorated this year was approximately 300, that many members of the order—having died since it was organized 45 years ago. There are now 12 commanderies of the Knights in Rochester the 12th being formed recently at Corpus Christi Church. This commandery, however, did not take any official part in the ceremony, as its members have not yet received their uniforms. The order has about 11,000 members in the city.

BISHOP HICKEY WILL DEDICATE NEW CHURCH AT PIFFARD ON SUNDAY

Geneseo.—On Sunday, June 22, Right Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D.D., bishop of the Rochester Diocese will visit the Geneseo, Piffard and Retsof parishes. In Geneseo he will administer the sacrament of confirmation immediately after the 8 o'clock mass. At 11 o'clock in Piffard, assisted by the priests of the deanery, he will dedicate the newly acquired St. Raphael's Church. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon Bishop Hickey will confirm a class at St. Lucy's Church at Retsof.

CORPUS CHRISTI

On next Sunday, if the weather permits, the solemn Corpus Christi procession at the close of the Mass will take place on the spacious lawn near the school, where two altars will be erected for Benediction. The graduating class and the Knights of St. John, as well as the school children will be in the procession. Closing exercises of Corpus Christi School will be held in the Church on next Sunday evening, June 22nd, at 8 o'clock. Rev. Charles F. Shay, rector of the Cathedral, will speak on this occasion. The Sacrament of Confirmation was administered to a large class by the Right Reverend Bishop last Sunday evening. On Thursday, June 19th, the Feast of Corpus Christi, a novena to the Sacred Heart opened and will continue each evening to Friday, June 27th, the feast.

FIRST MASS NEXT SUNDAY

Rev. John Lyons, of Dansville, will say his first mass Sunday morning at his home church, St. Mary's of Dansville. He received Holy Orders last Saturday at Louisville, Kentucky, coming to Dansville this week for a few days stay with his father, Mr. Thomas Lyons and his brother, Charles, before returning to the south for his first charge. Father Lyons was born in Dansville and received his early education at St. Mary's parochial school and the local High School, afterwards attending St. Andrews preparatory school in Rochester, St. Bernard's seminary in Rochester. For the past two years he has been attending the Theological college at Webster Grove, Mo., where he received the minor orders. He is a member of the local Council No. 785, K. of C., and his friends in that council are planning a testimonial to present to him. Father Lyons' mother died during the past year.

Mason To Lead Aquinas Five

Thomas "Red" Mason, star scholastic forward, has been elected captain of the Aquinas basketball team for the season of 1924-1925. The little fellow received practically every vote cast in the election. Mason's election to the captaincy is the reward of his untiring efforts for Aquinas for the last three seasons. The highest scorer in this city for two straight years, "Red" gained the reputation of being Rochester's "Wonder Boy." In 1922-23 "Red" scored 244 points. At that time he shot all of Aquinas fouls. With the elimination of the one-man foul shooter last fall, it was believed that another might win Mason's laurels, but during the season just closed the little fellow threw 85 field goals and 35 fouls for a total of 397 points, being made the only local high school player to come close to the double century mark. His total of 34 goals from the field is perhaps the largest ever registered by a Rochester school-boy player. Aquinas will be strong on the court again next season with Captain Mason, "Whisper" Mason, center; Joe Kennedy and Johnnie O'Reilly, both forwards, and Leo Sullivan and Tod O'Neill guards.

Leary Wins Six Games

The Maroon baseball nine closes this season with a record of nine victories in ten games. Only Albion High won from Aquinas. The Frank Strohlers defeated East Rochester High, Fairport High, and Avon High, twice each, and Webster High, Painted Post High and C.B.A. of Syracuse, once. The last two are among the strongest in the state. Jimmy Dunn led Aquinas in hitting with an average of .484 in ten games, and also led in base stealing, with seven thefts. Les Spiegel finished second to Dunn with 144 in eight games. Dunn made sixteen hits in 33 times at bat; Spiegel made fifteen hits in 24 times at bat. Mort Leary, Aquinas pitching ace, took his place along side the leading scholastic hurlers in Western New York, by winning six straight games and being undefeated for the season. Dunn won two of three games.
