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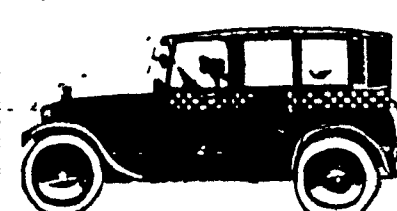

Knights of St. John To Hold Convention Here

Arrangements are being made by the Rochester Knights of St. John for the thirty-fifth convention in this city of the Knights of St. John and Ladies' Auxiliary during the week of July 13th. Frank K. Schwab, mayor of Buffalo, is supreme president of the Knights of St. John, and Teresa Ganster, of this city is supreme head of the Ladies Auxiliary. The headquarters of the knights during the convention will be at the Powers Hotel and of the auxiliary at the Hotel Seneca. The sessions of each organization will be held at the hotel which it has selected for its headquarters.

The opening session of the convention of both the knights and the ladies will convene on Monday, July 14th. The Rochester Committee, which is headed by Colonel J. H. Weis as honorary chairman and by Frank H. Biel, a member of the board of supreme trustees, as general chairman. The visitors will arrive here on Saturday and Sunday in order that they may be entertained and given an opportunity to make a sight-seeing trip of the city.

The convention will be the first of the Knights of St. John to be held in Rochester since 1902. Fully 10,000 visitors are expected, including the delegates, and entertainment is being planned for every night of the convention week.

Besides Colonel Weis and Mr. Biel the members of the Executive Committee are Frank J. Koch, treasurer, Raymond Crambach, William F. Shafer, Anthony Meng and Mrs. Theresa Ganster.

Colonel Weis has enlisted the support of all commandaries in Rochester in entertaining the knights who will come here from all parts of the country as well as Canada, Jamaica and the Panama Canal Zone. Large delegations are assured from Cincinnati, Columbus, Cleveland, Dayton, Toledo, Detroit, Buffalo, Syracuse, Utica, Albany, Poughkeepsie, Louisville and other cities, hundreds of whom will march in the parade which will be one of the big features of the convention.

Diocesan Teachers' Association Hold Annual Conference

The teachers of the Rochester diocese are made up of three teaching committees of sisters: the Sisters of St. Joseph, the Sisters of Mercy and the Sisters of Notre Dame, among whom are distributed the various parochial grammar schools, high schools and academies of the diocese which now has an enrollment of approximately 29,000 pupils. These are distributed as follows: Two academies for young women, three high schools, sixty-five parish schools and three orphan asylums. This enrollment does not include the diocesan seminaries of St. Bernard's and St. Andrew's, which have an enrollment of more than three hundred students.

Following the custom of having papers read by visiting educators and national reports which are discussed and followed by sectional meetings of the primary, intermediate and high school departments at which recommendations are made about courses of study and the like, addresses were given Monday morning by the Rev. John I. Barrett, diocesan superintendent of schools in Baltimore, on "Qualities of a Good Teacher," Tuesday morning addresses were given by the same experts on "Defects and Remedies in Reading" and the "Teaching of English in the Grades."

The conference came to a close on Tuesday with the summary and address to teachers by Bishop Thomas F. Hickey, who presided at all the sessions for the two days.

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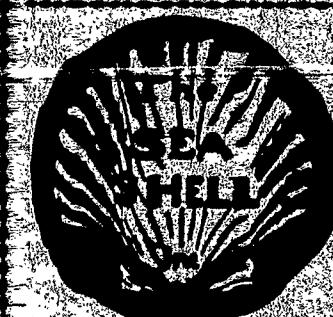
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
