

Catholic War Dead Roll Call at Tomb Of Unknown Soldier

(By N. C. W. C. News Service) Washington, D. C., Aug. 29.—Arrangements for one of the most impressive ceremonies to be witnessed at the convention of the Holy Name Society here—that of honoring the Catholic war dead at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington cemetery—are about completed.

Soldier Surrenders Reliquary Bearing Sail of Clement XII

News Service) London, Aug. 21.—Much interest has been aroused by the discovery in London of a magnificent reliquary containing relics of seventeen saints and a seal of Pope Clement XII in perfect condition. It is in the possession of a soldier, who during the shelling of Peronne, rescued it from a burning church. He brought it home and placed it for safety in a bank. He recently took it out and exhibited it to the ecclesiastical authorities for an opinion as to its value. Inquiries show that no such reliquary is missing from the treasury of Peronne, and it is thought that it must have been taken there for safety from some church further forward on the front.

Baron And Baroness Anatole Von Hugel Decorated By Pope

London, August 23.—The Pope has created Baron Anatole Von Hugel Knight Commander of the Order of St. Gregory, and bestowed the Cross Pro Ecclesia on the Baroness. The Baron is a brother of the eminent scholar Baron Fredrick von Hugel and is an M. A. and D. Sc. of Cambridge. He was for many years Curator of the University Museum of Archaeology and Ethnology, and has travelled in Australia and Polynesia. He was hired in 1921. For nearly forty years he and the Baroness have been leaders of Catholic life in the University and town. The Baroness is the eldest daughter of the late William Froude, F. R. S., of the same family as Hurrell Froude, the friend of Newman, and James Anthony Froude, the historian.

Archaeological Find Rewards Restorers Of Belgian Village

Noted French Ace Now Missionary In New Guinea

If it were left to him, he would be quite willing to be forgotten there. But his name has come up again in France. One of his former comrades at arms having told his story in one of the big Paris newspapers, the readers expressed the desire to open a subscription to offer him, if he desires it, an airplane which would facilitate his visitations to the various stations of his distant mission field. Father Bourjade has made known, however, that he is not in a position, now, to accept this offer.

Rome Pilgrimage To Lourdes Shrine

Catholic Customs And Symbols

(By R. Rev. H. T. Henry, Litt. D.) Scapular Colors and Images The recognized "small scapulars" of the laity are nearly a score in number. Always of woolen cloth, they vary greatly in color and in the designs they bear. The Holy See permits some latitude in these two respects, but in certain cases requires conformity with a specified design. The strings, cords or bands of cloth of which they are made may be of any material or color, perhaps for the reason that they formed no part of the original habit or monastic scapular, which was simply one continuous broad band of cloth. There are two exceptions. The strings of the Red Scapular of the Passion (which must not be confused with the Red Scapular of the Most Precious Blood), must be of wool and red in color, although the strings of the latter may be of any material.

Bishop Freri Sails For His New Post

Scapular of Seven Dolours The color of the Seven Dolours Scapular must be black, since in a vision Our Lady indicated this color as symbolic of her grief at the death of her Son.

In the Scapular of St. Joseph, the violet indicates his humility, the yellow his justice. The symbolic images on the white Scapular of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus in Agony and of the Most Loving and Sorrowful Heart of Mary (approved April 4, 1900), must be retained as given in the application for approval by the Holy See.

These are some illustrations of symbolism in scapulars. Doubtless in all the scapulars the colors and figures or pictures possess an intended symbolism, whether the scapulars be miniature habits, or badges of confraternities, or merely emblems of some special devotion.

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
