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Georgia Democrat Says No Delegate Insulted Cardinal

Atlanta, Ga., Sept. 15.—Publication of an article headed, "Georgia Woman Refuses to Join in Prayer with Cardinal Hayes" caused J. J. Spalding of this city to seek information concerning the actions of the Georgia delegation to the Democratic National Convention from N. A. Morris of Marietta, Ga., the head of the delegation.

In reply to a letter enclosing a clipping of the article, which asserted that when Cardinal Hayes came to the platform to make the opening prayer "all arose except an old lady, who slapped the face of a man who asked her to rise and then put her fingers on her ears," Mr. Morris wrote:

"This publication is an absolute lie. There isn't a word of truth in it. I was present when this prayer was delivered, and was present when every ballot was cast in the convention, and present from the beginning of the convention until it adjourned, and I know that every member of the Georgia delegation arose to their feet while the prayer was being delivered. In view of the fact that so much criticism had been made of the Georgia delegation in advance of the meeting of the convention, and during the convention, I was especially anxious that no act should be committed by any of the Georgia delegation during any of the proceedings which could be construed as a discourteous act, or which would subject them to legitimate criticism, and having this in view, when Cardinal Hayes came to the platform to deliver his prayer, I especially notified to see if all the Georgia delegates arose to their feet, and I know they did. In fact, I was sitting on the front seat, and when the announcement was made that Cardinal Hayes would deliver the prayer, I instantly turned facing the Georgia delegation and raised my hands, and notified that every member of the delegation arose to their feet."

Mr. Morris declared further that there was no old lady in the Georgia delegation. Those who were not young had not passed middle age. When Governor Smith appeared, Mr. Morris said, the whole Georgia delegation arose and cheered him and every time his crippled manager, Franklin Roosevelt, passed the delegation on his crutches he was applauded by the Georgia delegates.

Catholicism Openly Attacked in Czech Manual For Teachers

Warsaw, Sept. 10.—How justifiable it is for the Slovaks to oppose the introduction of Czech text books in their schools is shown in the following:
In his history books for teachers' seminars, Dr. Novak writes: "Rome and all Catholicism is a spiritual-destroying reaction, all religion is only hypothesis. Jesus was only the founder of a religion and a leader of the people, just as, for instance, Minister Hodza and Srobar, Rome is an enemy of the Slovak nation. It is Machiavellism which stands by means of might and gold alone."
"The 'Textbook of Holy Morals' in teachers' seminars, compiled by Johann Cerny, contains the following passages:

"The contradiction between religion and science has lasted up to the present time, and it is therefore difficult to reconcile moral philosophy with ecclesiastic morality, which is dependent on dogma. Many people have a religion which is far above all religion, and therefore require neither priests nor churches."

Cardinal Bourne Changes Attitude On Church Bazaars

London, Sept. 15.—For years opposed to bazaars and similar money raising efforts, Cardinal Bourne has announced his conversion. One of his predecessors, Cardinal Manning, condemned them more or less openly, but Cardinal Bourne has never done more than refuse to give them his sanction. He regarded them as means of getting people to give money against their will, under a sort of "voluntary compulsion."

Cardinal Bourne confessed his change of mind when opening a garden fete at Newcastle this week. "I used to think," he said, "that almsgiving and contributions to good works should be anonymous and based upon such high motives that nothing in the shape of temporal inducements should be allowed to enter."

He had changed that opinion because he had come to see that such gatherings tended to bring people together in mutual sympathy and co-operation. "Besides," added Cardinal Bourne, "my father's people is give who would not give in any other way."

A. functionaries, declared that he was not allowed to present all his witnesses, that several of the charges were not thoroughly investigated, and that Mr. Cooper acted as a "defense attorney" rather than as a judge. Bowwell declared he is not attacking the Y. M. C. A. as an institution, but is protesting against the activities of the two men named. The charges originally made involved allegations of threats of physical violence to veterans, religious discrimination, and discrimination against supporters of the La Follette-Wheeler ticket.
