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Five Million Cards To Be Sold By Shrine At Christmas Season

Washington, D. C., Oct. 27.—A quarter of a million Christmas post-cards already have been shipped to units of the Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, as a beginning in the annual sale of the cards for the benefit of the Shrine fund. It is planned this year to dispose of five million cards. By selling these cards, which present unusually artistic expression to religious sentiments of the season, at \$1.05 for a set of twelve, the Shrine realizes a considerable sum each year. This phase of the Shrine project has grown to these huge proportions in a remarkably short time.

Bishop Thomas J. Shahan, rector of the Catholic University of America and originator of the Shrine project, Dr. McKenna, and two of the architects of the Shrine conferred recently in Detroit with Mrs. Mary Chase Stratton, the artist in charge of the ceramic decorations for the Shrine. Mrs. Stratton has just returned from Europe, where she visited the most famous of the ancient cathedrals of the Old World, observing the artistic embellishments to add her work for the Shrine.

On his way back to Washington, Bishop Shahan stopped in Philadelphia to preside at the convention of the International Federation of Catholic Alumni, whose 50,000 members have promised to bear the expense of the Mary Altar in the crypt.

Cardinal Hayes Favors Parks Bond Issue

New York, October 29.—Because of his known interest in the welfare of children, for whom the proposed extensions of the park system of New York State would provide additional or more accessible play places in virtually all sections of the State, the State Council of Parks, and advisory body created by the last Legislature to coordinate and unify the State Park system, sought the aid of Cardinal Hayes, and gained his support of the \$15,000,000 bond issue which is subject to a popular referendum at the approaching election.

Members of the State Council of Parks also announced that another reason for asking the Cardinal to the bond issue was that the Catholic Charities of the Archdiocese of New York maintains in the Bear Mountain section of the Palisades Interstate Park, a summer camp named after the Cardinal, where hundreds of boys get vacations. These are numerous other camps for boys and girls throughout the State maintained by the various Catholic diocesan heads.

The advisory committee of the State Council of Parks made public on Sunday, October 19, the following letter from Rev. Robert F. Keegan, the Cardinal's secretary for charities:

"His Eminence, the Cardinal Archbishop, directs me to answer your communication of October 19, in reference to the State parks bond issue to be voted upon by the citizens of New York State at the coming election.

"His Eminence is entirely in sympathy with the purposes of the bond issue. He is convinced that the extension of our State park system will be for the benefit of our own 'Camp' within the confines of the Interstate Park near Bear Mountain, is one of the most important of the great good things that have come from the extension of the parks.

"His Eminence cordially endorses the bond issue and hopes that the citizens of New York State will vote in favor of it."

Section of the face of the voting machine. After you have voted the straight Republican ticket. Notice that all sixteen pictures above the squares containing the pictures of the Eagle, the letter B, the names of the Republican candidates and the word Republican are pulled down so the knobs on the pointers are in the center of the squares.

When the face of the machine looks like this you will know you have voted the Republican ticket when you leave the booth.

If the instructions given are followed it will take you only sixteen seconds to vote.

Here is the face simile of a section of the face of the voting machine as it looks when you enter the booth to vote. Notice that the rows of pointers, run from left to right. Notice particularly that the pointers used in voting the Republican ticket are Above the names of the Republican candidates.

It may be easier for you to remember that the pointers used in voting the Republican ticket are Above the pictures of the Eagles that appear in the squares alongside the names of the Republican candidates.

A third way to remember is to fix it in your mind that the pointers used in voting the Republican ticket are Above the squares designated 1-B, 2-B, 3-B, 4-B, 5-B, 6-B, 7-B, 8-B, 9-B, 10-B, 11-B, 12-B, 13-B, 14-B, 15-B, and 16-B, in which appear the names of the republican candidate and the Eagles.

A fourth way to remember that the pointers used in voting the Republican ticket are Above the squares showing the Eagles, the letter B, the names of the Republican candidates and the word Republican.

HOW TO VOTE IN SIXTEEN SECONDS

Proposition No. 1
YES
No. 1. To extend the State Park System by the issue of \$15,000,000 of State bonds, to be voted on at the general election of 1930.

Proposition No. 2
YES
No. 2. To amend the Constitution of the State of New York, by adding to Article XXII, Section 1, the following: "The State Council of Parks, and advisory body created by the last Legislature to coordinate and unify the State Park system, shall have the right to recommend to the Legislature the issue of bonds for the purpose of extending the State Park System."
