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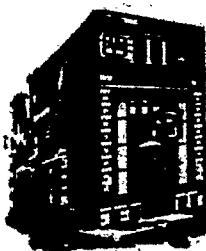
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Corpus Christi Church

Immaculate Conception

Rev. Joseph S. Cameron, rector of the Immaculate Conception Church, one of the most important parishes in the diocese of Rochester, announced at services Sunday that 1924 had been the most satisfactory year financially in the history of the parish.

Receipts for the year amounted to \$1,677.62. Father Cameron's annual financial report stated, and after expenses of \$38,940.73 had been met out of this, it was possible to transfer \$10,000 to the church's building fund, which now amounts to \$52,664.56, in addition to the value of extensive property. Had it not been for the necessity of unusual repairs to church property during the year, costing nearly \$6,000, he said, a larger sum would have been added to the building fund.

The rector announced that construction will begin soon on the new parochial school, and that the first wing of it in Glasgow street is expected to be ready for use next fall.
