Broadcasting First Visioned In Parable Of Sower And Seed

New York, Feb. 20.—The Rev.
John Handy, C. S. P., who has been
placed in charge of the Paulist Fa-
thers' project of installing a high
power radio broadcasting station to
disseminate education in Catholic
doctrine and Catholic activities, tells
his parishioners here that the term
"broadcasting" originated in the par-
able of the Sower and the Seed.

"There are many who are doubtful
about the value of the radio as a
means of teaching religion," Father
Handy says. "I want to call their
attention to this point—that Our
Lord thought it worth while to
broadcast the Word of God in spite
of the fact that some of the seed fell
by the wayside, and some on a rock,
and some was choked with thorns.
He thought it worth while because
He hoped some would fall on good
ground and bring forth fruit."

Jewish Exhibition To Mark 1000 Years Of Rhineland History

Cologne, Feb. 11.—It has been
announced here that the Jews will
gather a great exhibition in Cologne
in connection with the celebration of
a thousand years of adhesion of the
Rhineland to Germany.

While there were Christian settle-
ments in the Rhineland in the
Second century, the Jews came com-
paratively a short time afterward in
the Fourth century. Since that time
they have clung persistently to the
country, despite the most furious
persecutions at various times and
under various leaders. At Cologne,
Worms, Mainz, Speier and other
cities are records of their presence
and their activities. At times, these
documents show, they have played
important roles in Rhenish history.

The exhibition now planned will
deal largely with the inner life of
the Jews—their religious practices,
their cultural life, their writing and
their art. There will be many ancient
manuscripts, replicas of old syna-
gogues, sacred vessels, portraits and
early home furnishings. Every ar-
chive is being searched to make the
exhibition complete. The senior rabbi,
Dr. Kober, is to be president of
the project.

Auburn Assembly K. of C. Holds Silver Jubilee

Dinner of Fourth Degree Marks
Anniversary

A silver jubilee dinner, the com-
mending of the Fourth Degree and a
special program of entertainment
marked the anniversary festivities
held Sunday by the Auburn Assem-
bly, Knights of Columbus. The
Fourth Degree was 25 years old
February 22nd. Nearly 100 percent
attendance of fourth degree mem-
bers was achieved. The charter
membership of the fourth degree at
its inception numbered 1,200. Today
this branch of the fraternity has a
registered membership of 100,000
throughout the country.

The banquet was served in the
dining room of the new home in
Genesee Street, Luke J. Lane, faith-
ful navigator of Auburn Assembly,
was toastmaster and master of cere-
monies. Frank J. Lesch was song
leader in community singing.

Addresses were delivered by
Frank H. Shields of Auburn, master
of the Fifth New York District, and
Dr. M. P. Conway who traced the
history of the fourth degree from its
birth a quarter of a century ago.
Rev. John A. Conway, pastor of the
Holy Family Church, in a strong
message on patriotism drew exam-
ples from the lives of Washington
and Lincoln.

Plan Big Initiation
At the conclusion of the program
plans for the big initiation of can-
didates into the fourth degree from
the various councils in Central New
York next Spring were informally
discussed.

A program of entertainment was
given in the reception room follow-
ing the banquet. Music was furnis-
hed by Teeter's Rainbow orchestra.
Songs were sung by members of the
St. Mary's Dramatic Club. Perform-
ers included Thomas Hayes, Francis
Smith, Paul Graney, James O'Hern,
A dancing specialty was given by
Vernon Mitchell. Several vocal selec-
tions given by Joseph Heleck. Ger-
ald Gonroy accompanied him on the
piano.

Red, white and blue, the assem-
bly's colors, were used extensively
in decorations for the banquet.
Members were each given miniature
American flags to be worn in lapels
for the evening.

It was announced that the annual
fourth degree St. Patrick dance
would be held at the Osborne House
Tuesday evening, March 17. Martin
H. Welch has been appointed chair-
man of the committee on arrange-
ments.

celebration was composed of Dennis
F. Sullivan, chairman; Charles P.
McConnell, Dr. William F. Foley,
Donald Donnelly, James A. Murphy.
Officers of the Auburn assembly

admiral; Rev. William Payne, faith-

Ceremonial April 26.
Councils in the Knights of Colum-
bus district comprising Auburn,
Syracuse, Rochester, Seneca Falls,
Waterloo, Geneva, Penn Yan, Canan-
daigua, Oswego, Fulton and Newark
will hold an exemplification of the
fourth degree in Auburn, April 26,
under the direction of the Auburn
Assembly. This announcement was
made last Sunday by Frank H.
Shields, master of the fifth district.

Due to the poor conditions of the
highways, permit has been received
to hold the ceremonial in April in-
stead of the customary Washington's
Birthday. Officers and dignitaries
of the national organization have
been invited as guests to this cere-
mony. It is probable the event will
be staged at the Armory with a ban-
quet at the Osborne House.

About 175 members, will be ele-
vated to the fourth degree at this
exercise. Of this number 75 will be
from the Auburn Council.
