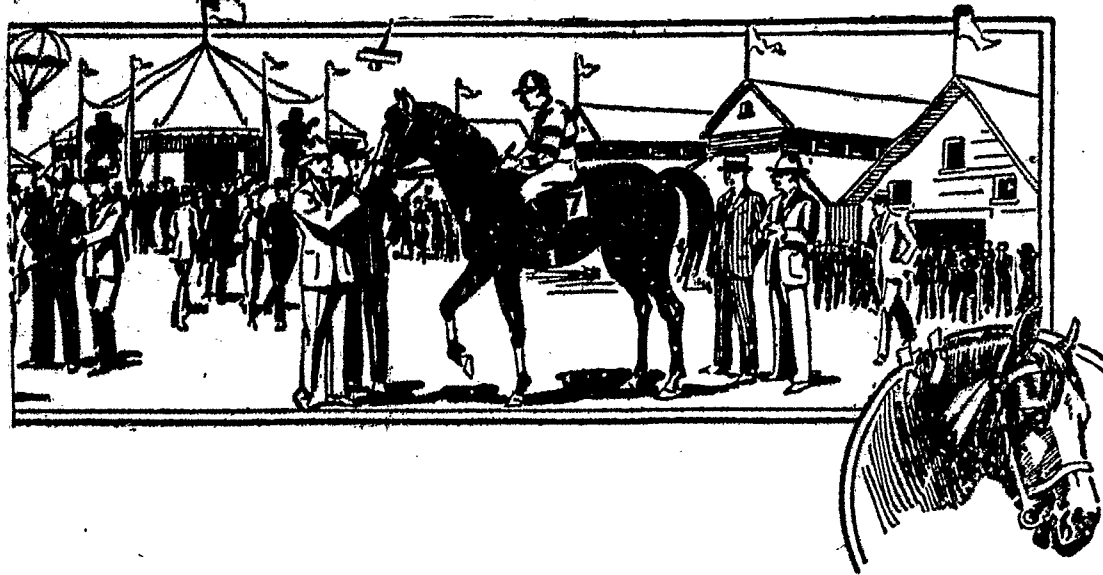

Tablet Unveiled
At Oldest Church
West Of Mississippi

St. Louis, June 17.—Three thousand St. Louis Knights of the St. Louis General Assembly attended the unveiling of a bronze tablet at St. Ferdinand's church at Florissant last Sunday to commemorate the oldest church now standing west of the Mississippi.

High Mass at 8 o'clock with the Rev. Joseph Millet, S. J., the pastor, as celebrant began the day's ceremonies. After the Mass addresses were made by State Deputy Paul E. Pautter and State Secretary Lawrence P. Walsh, both of St. Louis.

The unveiling of the tablet in front of St. Ferdinand's church took place at 2 p. m. when the Rev. James J. O'Meara, S. J., 85 years of age and the oldest member of his Order in America, presided, and solemnly dedicated the memorial tablet. Faithful Navigator John J. Griffin of the Fourth Degree K. of C. St. Louis, made the presentation speech and other addresses were made by Mayor Sidney Garrett of Florissant, Rev. Lawrence Kenney, S. J., of St. Louis University and former Circuit Judge O'Neill Ryan of St. Louis.

In the little cemetery on the adjacent grounds of St. Stanislaus Seminary, a Crucifix thirty feet in height was then dedicated, this ceremony being presided over by the Rev. Francis Kemper, S. J., president of the seminary, and the Rev. Francis Millet, S. J., officiating. Solemn Benediction followed in St. Ferdinand's Church, at which were heard selections by the Knights of Columbus Choral Club and Band. The entire program of the day was under the direction of Harry G. Whelan of St. Louis, past Faithful Navigator of the Fourth Degree General Assembly.

Augustinians Buy
Hudson River Estate

New York, June 19.—The Augustinian Order has purchased Carnwarth, the extensive and beautiful Isaac Untermyer estate at New Hamburg-on-the-Hudson, and will use it as a novitiate for its scholasticate of Villanova, Pa., it has been announced here.

Carnwarth contains about 200 acres and has a 25-room brick residence, several cottages, a garage, a flower conservatory, large stables and farm buildings.

Noted Jesuit Keeps
Diamond Jubilee At
Mirador Observatory

Baguio, P. I., May 11.—At the Jesuit Observatory of Mirador, Father Francisco de P. Sanchez, S. J., a native of Tarragona, Spain, celebrated today the diamond jubilee of his entrance into the religious life. Perched on a mountain peak overlooking the Chinese Sea and 5,000 feet in this observatory serves as a rest-house and a summer-school for the Jesuits of the Philippines. Gathered here are Spanish, Filipino and American Jesuits, and besides the religious part of the celebration, therefore, there was a colorful entertainment with Andalusian singing, Irish-American limericks and Ilocano poetry added to the more serious tributes of esteem and praise.

Father Sanchez was born in 1849 and entered the Society of Jesus in 1866. Exiled from his native land by the religious persecutions of 1868, he continued his studies in France, only to be expelled in turn from that country with the other Jesuits in 1871. In 1872 he came to the Philippines to begin his real life's work, and since that time has spent almost 50 years in these islands. Teaching in the famous Ateneo de Manila, he was professor in 1876 and 1876 of the little Jose Rizal, who was destined to become the national hero of the Philippines.

Many of the intervening years have been spent in the Ateneo, where Father Sanchez built up the wonderful natural history museum which has the reputation of being the finest in the country. He spent many years in the mission country of Mindanao and in 1892 when stationed as Dapitan on that island, renewed his intimacy with Rizal, who as a revolutionary suspect, was held there on parole. During the revolution in 1899, while at Tandag in Mindanao, Father Sanchez narrowly escaped death.

Father Sanchez is held in great veneration throughout the whole country, not only because he is the only surviving professor of the nation's greatest hero, but also because of the great influence he has had during his long career upon thousands of Filipinos in all walks of life. On the evening of March 15, just before the war season began, a grand reception and banquet was tendered to the jubilant by his affectionate old pupils in the College theatre of the Ateneo. Supreme Court Justice Romualdez, Attorney Gregorio Arana, Senator Emiliano Tria Tirona, Doctors Fernando Calderon, Arista, Bautista and Baldomero Roxas, Joaquin Balmori, the Catholic labor leader, and many other leading citizens attended.

The church was represented by the Apostolic Delegate, Msgr. Piani, and the Archbishop of Manila, Msgr. O'Doherty, and the City Council of the city of Manila bestowed the title of Hijo Adoptivo (Adopted Son) upon Father Sanchez, an honor never before given to any native or foreigner.

Irish Protestant
Bishop Aligned With
Opponents Of Divorce

Dublin, June 10.—Senator Douglas, who recently brought forward a motion in the Free State Senate raising the issue as to the procedure to be followed for Divorce Bills in that assembly, is himself a Protestant professing a general repugnance to divorce. His motion was concerned with matters of form, but some political observers thought it might serve the purpose of clearing the air by providing a reason for full discussion of the whole question. This, however, was a mistaken view. Mr. Douglas's motion would have allowed persons seeking divorce to have their private bills for the purpose read at least a first time, and in this way all the basic facts of a divorce case could any time be unfolded to the Senate even though the affair could not be carried a step further.

In short the Protestant attitude towards the whole question in the Free State Legislature, is uncertain and shifty. It is noteworthy, however, that one of the ablest members of the Irish Protestant Hierarchy, has come boldly out on the anti-divorce side. Dr. Plunket, the Protestant Bishop of Meath, has specifically stated to the clergy of his diocese that marriage is permanent, sacred and indissoluble, and he has expressed his pride in the thought that the great majority of his fellow countrymen are strongly defending that true Christian view against all the attacks, whether open or insidious, of a decadent and self-indulgent world.

Slovakian Clergy
Makes Protest

Prague, June 4.—The Catholic clergy of Slovakia has registered a vigorous protest against the injustice of the Land Office's administration of the Land Control Act, which has operated to split up much church property, with resultant confusion and suffering. Czechoslovakia's Land Control Act provided that all large estates be placed under government control, and that the Land Office be empowered to divide these estates and transfer them to new owners or tenants, provided the original owners were compensated. The Land Office positions, however, fell into political hands, there has been favoritism and the Church has suffered severely.

In effect, the clergy complain that nearly all the estates of the Church in the country were split up when the Act first went into effect five years ago, whereas other large private holdings are still intact. Furthermore, although the Compensation Law provided that proper indemnities and pensions should be provided, thousands of officials and employees of the church estates have lost their positions and nothing has been done for them. No provision whatever has been made for the thousands of Slovak Catholic laborers who annually came down from the mountains to work on the estates.

Embassy At Vatican
To Be Debated Again
By French Deputies

Paris, June 13.—"La Croix" announces that a re-opening of a debate in the French Chamber on the maintenance of the Vatican Embassy may be expected in the near future. The present Cabinet has informed the Senate that it did not contemplate the suppression of the Vatican, but up to the present it has not made known whether or not it intends to ask for an increase in the appropriations voted by the Chamber following the stormy debate which caused such a sensation throughout the country.

A group of socialists and radical-socialists are planning to ask for detailed information on the subject. It has been pointed out to them that the Minister of Foreign Affairs has the right to make whatever disposal he will of credits entered in a given chapter of the budget and that the detailed distribution of these credits is merely listed in the budget on informative grounds. Nevertheless, M. Lamoureux, reporter-general, has been delegated to send a letter to the Government demanding that its intentions be made known to the Committee.

Mexicans Rejoice
In Dedication Of
Land To Holy Ghost

El Paso, June 17.—Word has been received by the "Revista Catolica" here of the magnificent ceremonies held in honor of the solemn consecration of Mexico to the Holy Ghost.

A special program had been arranged by the members of the Committee appointed by the Archbishop of Mexico, Msgr. Mora y del Rio, on Saturday, May 30, vigil of the Feast of Pentecost, a solemn vigil was held by the members of the Association of Nocturnal Adoration. From nine o'clock until half past eleven hymns were sung by the Orfeon Groups of the Councillor Seminary and at midnight Pontifical High Mass was celebrated by Dr. Maximiano Ruiz y Flores, Titular Bishop of Derbe and Auxiliary of the Archdiocese of Mexico City. The sermon was preached by the Rt. Rev. Pascual Diaz, S. J., Bishop of Tabasco. On Sunday, May 31, Pontifical Mass was celebrated by Msgr. Mora y del Rio, Archbishop of Mexico, and Bishop Diaz again preached the sermon. Following the Mass the Archbishop read the act of consecration. The Blessed Sacrament was then carried in procession and remained exposed all day. Similar ceremonies were held in all the other churches in honor of the consecration.
