Plan Celebration
Italian Catholics in the north-eastern section of Rochester are planning for an elaborate celebration on Aug. 2 in the Annunciation Church, Norton and North Goodman streets, and will begin with a solemn high mass to be celebrated at 10 o'clock by the Rev. George Weimann, rector of the church. He will be assisted by two other priests and benediction will also be given.
All children of Annunciation Church, who have made their first communion, Italian Societies of the county, including the Sons of Italy and former service men of Italian parentage, will take part in a parade, which will begin at 2:30 o'clock and end at 3 o'clock.

Cardinal Hayes Visits Summer School Mid-Summer Carnival Held

Rev. John D. Roach, President of the Catholic Summer School was the preacher at the 10-30 mass Sunday morning. The noble-hearted Father Roach warned his hearers against "the false prophets who come to you in clothing of sheep but inwardly they are ravening wolves." He declared that those words of Our Lord are applicable to the present-day Christ, as the promised Redeemer of mankind is speaking to us today just as directly as he did to the people of His time.

We have false teachers everywhere. Some deny existence of God. Some perhaps do not know they are teaching falsehoods; they have one track minds and can only see their particular line of thought. Though they may be earnest and zealous, we must beware of them. So also with a certain class of scientists who believe there is no truth in the world except those they have learnt in their particular science. Some of them teach that evolution is a certainty, whereas it is not even a well-supported theory. "A theory," said Father Roach "in plain language is a guess. It is never like the certainties of mathematics. The theory of gravitation, for several centuries accepted as true, has been attacked in recent years by the adherents of the relatively theory. It is not of interest to us, as far as religion is concerned, whether or no the theory of relativity will finally triumph. Religion does not change with every change of physical science. Religion is the greatest science of them all because it is science of morality, a science which is vastly superior to everything that can be learned concerning any other science.
Many are totally ignorant of this greatest of all sciences. God is a spirit, the author of all existence. It is therefore absurd to say that there can be a clash between religion and the truths of physical science. It would be the case of one truth clashing with another. If we keep our eyes on the author of all things, we never can be led astray. We shall always keep in the straight path of truth. "It is for us at this time," concluded Father Roach "to promise that we shall beware of all false prophets, that we shall love God above all things and love our fellow human beings as we love ourselves."

During the week five morning lectures on History were given by Rev. Edward J. Harrison, Dean of Niagara University. Father Harrison stated that theories of history were almost as numerous as historians, but that he was going back from the popular playground of fims and fables and fashionable modern doubts, to take his stand with Augustine and view events largely and comprehensively as aspects of a high predestination. The lecturer argued that the real world was the moral world, that justice was the foundation of society, that social well-being was the reward of its prevalence, and that catastrophe was the necessary penalty of its violation. Father Harrison declared that right was no longer an absolute, jurat order given in reason, and independent of free volition; "It is an arithmetical sum," he said, "a process of addition, a vulgar counting of noses." The solution of our crises lies in the creative principles of the Gospels.

Four evening recitals were given by Miss Ruby McDonald distinguished Australian violinist. Miss McDonald charmed her hearers with pleasing numbers from such masters as Bach, Brahms, Handel, Rte, Hummel, Rimsky, Korakow, and Wienlawski.

Cliff Hayes residents were delightedly surprised Wednesday when they heard of the arrival of His Eminence Patrick Cardinal Hayes, Archbishop of New York. Many of the Summer School guests, for the most part non-residents of the Empire state, had the extreme pleasure of beholding the Archbishop for the first time. They thereafter ceased to wonder why he is held in such esteem by members of his flock as well as by those outside of the Catholic faith.

Cardinal Hayes accompanied by his secretary, The Very Rev. Mr. Stephen J. Donahue, D.D., were received by the Rt. Rev. Joseph H. Conroy, D. D., Bishop of Ogdensburg and Honorary President of the Catholic Summer School, and Rev. John D. Roach, President of the Catholic Summer School of America. On Thursday a reception, at which many persons, prominent in religious and social life were present, was given in his honor. Nothing was left undone to make the evening one that will ever be a pleasant memory.

The Cardinal's stay was brief but memorable.
The much advertised and long awaited for Mid-Summer Carnival took place in the Summer School Dining Hall, which had been artistically decorated for the occasion last Wednesday evening. The children's pageant opened the festivities. Valuable prizes, gifts of Summer School guests, were awarded to the men, women and children, who in the opinion of the judges appeared in the most historical, most beautiful, most original, and most grotesque costumes. There can be no question but that the large number in attendance at the Carnival will recall with pleasure the many surprises of a joyful evening, thanks to the untiring efforts of the Alumnae Auxiliary Association.

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
