Testimonial of \$2,228 Given Sacred Heart Church Assistant

Rev. Daniel B. O'Rourke, six years assistant rector at Sacred Heart Church, left the city this week to become pastor of the Catholic churches at Sodus and Marion, Wayne county. In addition to the two charges he will attend the chapel at Sodus Point.

The promotion was in recognition of the ten years of work of Father O'Rourke since his ordination, and with his departure from Sacred Heart Church a keen loss will be felt by the parishioners.

As ecclesiastical student and priest, Father O'Rourke has resided in this city since 1907 when he entered St. Andrew's Preparatory Diocesan Seminary. He was born in Scipio, Cayuga county, and was graduated from Holy Family parochial school and the high school in Auburn, a scholarship enabling him to complete the course in St. Andrew's in two years. He went to St. Bernard's Seminary and was ordained by Bishop Thomas F. Hekey, on June 12, 1915.

His first assignment was as assistant to Rev. John H. O'Brien, pastor of St. Augustine's Church in Chili avenue, serving there for four years. From there he was assigned to Sacred Heart Church.
