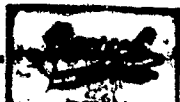

Rev. George F. Kettell Of St. Bernard's Sem. Joins Jesuit Order

Rev. George F. Kettell, of the faculty of St. Bernard's Seminary, has joined the Jesuit order at Shadbrook, Mass. By this step he feels that he will have a larger opportunity for usefulness. Dr. Kettell is known as an exceptional teacher, able orator and accomplished linguist.

He was ordained in 1914 in St. Patrick's Cathedral, and was assigned to St. Bernard's Seminary where he became a member of the faculty, remaining there until the United States entered the World War, when he was selected as one of the group of chaplains sent from this diocese to join the American Expeditionary Forces. He found such favor with Rochester boys in the war that, following his return, he was elected permanent chaplain of Yerkes-Couchman Post, 99, American Legion.

In September 1921 his ability was recognized to such an extent by Bishop Hickey that he was sent to Rome for a three years' course of study at the Pontifical Biblical School and upon the completion of his term he was awarded the degree of doctor of sacred theology.
