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Catholic League**Hold Convention In Brooklyn**

The twenty-eighth annual convention of the State Catholic League and its auxiliary, the Catholic Women's Union, was held Saturday and the first of this week in Brooklyn. Patrick Gaffney was elected treasurer of the league. Miss Laura K. Schilling, of St. Paul boulevard, was elected first vice-president of the Women's Union. Miss Schilling, by virtue of her office, Mrs. George Gugel and Mrs. Madge Spiegel, all of Rochester, were made members of the Executive Committee.

Mr. Gaffney has been active in the Rochester Catholic Federation. He is chairman of the Get-Acquainted Committee and is popular in the organization. Miss Schilling, a member of the Zonta Club, is one of Rochester's capable business women.

Among expressions adopted by the women at their state meeting was one approving the proposed law that immigrants be examined in their native countries. A copy of the League's expression will be sent to secretary of Labor Davis.

Another expression of the women for employing women in industrial occupations by legislation. One resolution was aimed at more respect for authority in the home, and another part of women citizens to make them at more modesty in dress. The resolutions urged study as a duty on the more intelligent voters.

The men's league voted to change its name to "the State Branch of the Catholic Circle Verein of America. Alois Werdnig, of Buffalo, was elected president. Other officers chosen included Harry M. Holnickel, of Albany; Henry Vick, of Utica; vice-presidents; Charles Stickney, of Poughkeepsie, marshal.

Aquinas Institute**Opens Tuesday With Large Attendance**

Aquinas Institute opened its new building on Dewey avenue Tuesday to eight hundred and fifty pupils, an increase of 250 over last year's enrollment, according to figures of Rev. William Byrne, new president of the faculty, who succeeds Rev. John E. Napier. Father Byrne stated that in all probability the enrollment would go over the 900 mark when late registrants have been accounted for. Exercises were held in the auditorium, and addresses were made by Bishop Thomas F. Hickey and Father Byrne.

Although the pupils are being registered and classes started, Father Byrne announced that the solemn dedication of the building will not take place until September 29th. Patrick Cardinal Hayes, archbishop of New York, will be in charge of the exercises, having accepted an invitation from Bishop Hickey. It is expected that a large number of bishops and clergy will attend the occasion. Final plans are being formulated and a definite program will be announced later.

Following the exercises in the auditorium, the pupils went to their various rooms where they received instructions as to plans for the coming year. They were dismissed shortly before noon. Father Byrne stated that full-time classes will not start until Monday morning, when the cafeteria will be opened. The new cafeteria is said to be one of the best in the state, having all modern equipment. The pupils will be able to get nutritious meals at a reasonable price.

Father Byrne, who for the past year has been acting as professor of philosophy at the new Nazareth Women's College, stated that he was more than pleased with the new school and the spirit of the pupils, and predicted a banner year along all lines of endeavor.

Opening Set For Nazareth Hall

Nazareth Hall Academy, private school for boarders and day pupils, under the tutelage of the Sisters of St. Joseph, and established since 1884, will reopen for the autumn semester Monday, September 14th. The school is situated in Raines park with the playground on Alameda street. During the vacation period many improvements have been made on the building and provision has been made to call for and return children who live at a distance. Besides the primary, intermediate and grammar departments, special training is given at the school in physical culture, elocution and music.
