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Allege Religious Test For Teachers Imposed In Colo.

Denver, Sept. 7.—Directors of 70 school boards in northern Colorado and one board in the southern section of the state will be made defendants in impeachment proceedings inaugurated by the Knights of Columbus on the grounds that they have made religious faith a test of the qualifications of applicants for teaching positions, in conflict with Article VI of the Constitution of the United States.

The action was decided upon at a meeting of state officers and district deputies of the Knights here, State Deputy John A. Stanko being authorized to institute proceedings.

"The Knights of Columbus have ample funds to prosecute every one of these cases," said Stanko, "and will go all the way. I have received letters from teachers in the three districts and we believe that the time has come to test the Constitution of the United States in the courts of Colorado. The situation is most grave."

Attorneys John H. Reddin, Charles F. Mahoney and John P. Morrissey will represent the Knights.

Near Centenarian Daily Communicant Is Dead In France

Paris, August 31.—Mme. Raudet, who died recently at Collinee, in the Colorado Nord, was ninety-seven years old and up until last November had attended Mass and received Communion daily.

She was noted for her practice of Christian mortification. She always observed Lent strictly notwithstanding the advanced age which would have been a dispensation from the observance of the fast. From her youth she had observed the fast of the Holy Saturday, not even in the case of being cited to a banquet that abundance of food was served.

Pershing Praises Admiral Benson's Service To Nation

Washington, D. C., Sept. 7.—Initiated by a few friends who had conceived the idea of a very modest affair, the testimonial banquet to be given to Admiral William S. Benson, September 19th, on the occasion of the completion of fifty years service in the nation, has assumed the proportions of one of the most important public events of its kind this year for the nation's capital.

Five hundred men and women from every walk of life will honor Admiral Benson by their presence at the banquet, which will be presided over by Martin Conboy, President of the Catholic Club of New York.

Among those who most recently announced their intention of being present are Major General Tasker H. Bliss, Major General John A. LeJeune, John Hayes Hammond, Colonel William J. Donovan, John Barton Payne, Mayor James Curley of Boston, and Rear Admirals Hillary P. Jones, W. W. Phelps, George R. Clark and W. L. Capps.

The Right Rev. Hugh Boyle, Bishop of Pittsburgh will be one of the principal speakers at the banquet, which will be given in Hotel Mayflower. Among other distinguished ecclesiastics who will attend are the Right Rev. Thomas J. Shahan, Rector of the Catholic University; the Right Rev. P. B. Heffron, Bishop of Winona; the Right Rev. William J. Hatoy, Bishop of Raleigh; Right Rev. Francis J. Tief, Bishop of Concordia, and the Very Rev. James A. Burns, C. S. C., President Emeritus of Notre Dame University, and the Rev. John J. Burko, C. S. P.

General John J. Washington Men Plan To Receive N. C. C. M. Delegates

Washington, D. C., Sept. 7.—Members of St. Martin's Council, N. C. C. M., are to be hosts to visiting delegates who will attend the fifth annual convention of the National Council of Catholic Men to be held here September 17, 18 and 19.

A solemn Pontifical Mass will be celebrated by the Rt. Rev. Thomas J. Shahan of the Catholic University, at St. Martin's Church on Thursday, September 17th and will officially open the convention. Immediately following the Mass there will be exercises incident to the presentation by St. Martin's Council of a set of American colors to the new St. Martin's School.

On Friday there will be a reception and dance in honor of the delegates and their friends at St. Martin's Council Clubhouse, which will be dedicated that night. The St. Martin's Council members will also be hosts to the delegates on an automobile tour of Washington Saturday afternoon.

The general conference of lay leaders which is to be one of the features of the convention will take place on Saturday, September 19th, instead of Friday as originally planned.

The general program has been amplified by the addition of Floyd Keeler, who will speak on the work of the Catholic Union and the Rev. John A. Lynch, C. S. R., who will discuss the activities of the Medical Mission Board of the Catholic Hospital Association.

Convention sessions will be held in the Lafayette Hotel and will be presided over by Admiral William S. Benson, President of the National Council of Catholic Men.
