Catholic Esperanto Congress In Paris

After the closing religious ceremony, held in the Basilica of the Sacred Heart, hymns also were sung in this international tongue.

Juvenile Crime Evil Conference Subject

Washington, D. C., Sept. 14. -- The growth of juvenile crime, regarded as one of the most important social problems of the day, was carefully covered in discussions of the Committee on Delinquency at the National Conference of Catholic Charities, which ended today.

The first meeting of the committee was given over to the general subject of "Probation." "A Study of the Results of Juvenile Probation" was contributed by Joseph M. Skeffington of Chicago, and "A Study of the Results of Adult Probation" was the subject of a paper read by Frederick I. Moran, Secretary of the State Probation Commission of Albany. The discussion on these papers was led by Louis F. S. Cook, Secretary of the Knights of Columbus Big Brothers Movement of Pittsburgh. Mrs. George V. McIntyre of Chicago presided.

The second meeting of the Committee on Delinquency was addressed by Mrs. Phillip C. McCormick of Chicago, who discussed "Motion Picture Problems" and by the Rev. Michael B. Schiltz, Director of Catholic Charities of Des Moines, whose subject was "Directed Time Leisure Activities." Miss Leslie M. Foy of the State Department of Welfare, Harrisburg, Pa., presided.

Social And Civic Ills Discussed By Experts

Washington, D. C., Sept. 14. -- Dr. David A. McCabe of Princeton University presided over the two meetings of the Committee on Social and Civic Activities held last week in conjunction with the National Conference of Catholic Charities.

The Rev. Dr. Francis J. Haas, of St. Francis Seminary, St. Francis, Wis., and Miss Marjorie E. Carroll of the Mount Carmel Guild, Buffalo, were the principal speakers at the first meeting.

Dr. Haas discussed "Setting Minimum Wages According to Minimum Quantity Standards," while Miss Carroll spoke on "The Wage Problem from the Standpoint of the Family Social Worker."

The second meeting, at which the general topic for discussion was "Unemployment," was addressed by the Rev. Dr. Henry C. Hengell, Chaplain of St. Paul's University Chapel, Madison, Wis., who spoke of "The Public Responsibility for Unemployment," and Dr. Thomas E. Larkin of St. Louis University, who discussed "The Responsibility of Industry." The discussion that followed was opened by Dr. Frank O'Hara, Professor of Political Economy at the

Notre Dame Student Overflow Sought At St. Edward's, Austin

Austin, Texas, Sept. 12 Application of the term "Notre Dame of the Southwest" to St. Edward's University here will become of greater significance in the near future when the overflow registration of Notre Dame University, South Bend, Ind., will be diverted to St. Edward's, thus bringing to Texas many youths who would otherwise have gone to the northern school.

Last year, according to the Rev. Dr. Joseph Burke, C. S. C. president of St. Edward's 100 men from south of the Mason and Dixon line, 50 of whom were from Texas, were registered at Notre Dame. The enrollment there was 2,500, and indications are that the freshman class alone this year will reach 1,000. This will mean that Notre Dame will soon be overcrowded and students will be turned toward St. Edward's.

"It is the fixed plan of Notre Dame," Father Burke said, "to limit its enrollment to 3,000. Its officers believe an enrollment greater than that causes a university to become unwieldy and to result in less efficient instruction. But Notre Dame is becoming so favorably known that applications for registration there will soon be more than it can accommodate. When this happens, growth at Notre Dame will shut off and we will hasten the expansion of St. Edward's, building here in Texas a school that will duplicate the activities of Notre Dame.

"Both universities are sponsored by the religious order known as the Congregation of the Holy Cross. Notre Dame, being the parent institution, has set the standard for St. Edward's but the faculties of the two schools are shifted back and forth, and St. Edward's is in no way being made secondary to Notre Dame."

Daniel Boyle, M. P., Irish Leader, Dead

London, Sept. 7. -- Mr. Daniel Boyle, who represented North Mayo, Ireland, in the British House of Commons from 1910 to 1918, has died at Cleveleys, near Blackpool. Mr. Boyle took a leading part for nearly 40 years in the municipal life of Manchester as well as in Irish affairs both in England and Scotland.
